PORTLAND CITY ELECTION.

Last Monday an election was held in the City of Portland for three members of the City Council. The Republicans fused and placed a ticket in the field and worked hard for its election. The Democrats and anti-Ring Republicans placed a ticket in the field also. The result was in favor of the Democratic and anti-Ring ticket by a majority of 543.

LOUISIANA.
