DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.—About half past four o'clock Sunday evening the citizens of our little burg were thrown into a furor of excitement by that dreaded cry of fire! fire! which generally succeeds in raising the excitement to the highest pitch imaginable. People collected on every corner, exclaiming: "Where's the fire," and were informed that Mr. Whitlow's barn was wrapped in flames. The answer was not needed, for the black smoke curling upward to meet the clouds told where the fire fiend was at work, and where the assistance of the people were needed, which they were not slow in offering. The brigade, armed with buckets and such other things as were needed, and could be got, rushed with a will to lend a helping hand in saving the property and perhaps life. A strong breeze was blowing directly from the barn toward the house, which was but a short distance away. The barn was entirely consumed with all it contained except a few bushels of wheat, and the house was only saved by the untiring and almost superhuman efforts of the generous citizens and a lucky change of wind. The probable loss will not fall far short of one thousand dollars as considerable of the new crop was already stored in the barn. The origin of the fire is supposed to have been from the firing of a gun at a squirrel, the wad lighting in the straw close by the barn, which soon ignited, the fire communicating with the barn.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

The recognition of the Spanish Republic by England, France and Austria is officially promulgated. The drought has greatly injured the crops all over the State of Arkansas, and not over a quarter of a crop is expected. Mary E. Pomeroy, the alleged victim of Rev. John S. Glendenning, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Jersey City, died on the 17th. In her death-bed statement she charged Glendenning with being the father of her child. The uncle of Charley Ross arrived at Bennington, Vermont, on the 11th. He says the little boy detained by the police is not his nephew. The London Post announces that negotiations between the Powers for a recognition of Spain have been completed with the consent of Great Britain. Bismarck has returned to Berlin from Kissingen. The Republican Congressional Convention, at Paynesville, Ohio, on the 12th, nominated Gen. J. A. Garfield. The Imparcial reports that England, France and Germany have formally recognized the Spanish Republic. The Spanish representative at Paris has applied to Madrid for full credentials as Minister. France has declared her readiness to recognize him. In the race at Rochester, on the 12, where Goldsmith Maid trotted a mile in 2:14, she was pitted against American Girl and Judge Fullerton. She beat her own time which was the best on record. News from various parts of the Indian country indicates that the Cheyennes, Comanches and Crows, seeing formidable preparations made to punish them for their recent depredations, ask for peace and for the military to call it even. Orders have, however, been issued not to let these hostile

bands enter reservations, but for the troops to follow and punish them wherever found.
