the State of Oregon: WHEREAS, At a general election held on the first day of June, A. D., 1873, the Hon. George A. LaDow was duly elected Representative of the State of Oregon in the Forty-fourth Congress of the United States; and

WHERE'AS, Since the said election, said office has become vacant by the death of said incumbent; and

WHEREAS, By provision of the Constitution of the United States, and the laws of this State, it has become the duty of the Governor thereof to issue his writ of election to fill such vacan-

Now, therefore, I, L. F. Grover, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby command you and each of you to notify the several Judges of Election within and for your several counties, to hold a special election of Representative in Congress to fill the vacancy aforesaid, on Monday, the 25th day of October, 1875, and that you cause all proper notices to be given thereof according to law.

Given under my hand and the seal of the State of Oregon, at Salem, this 15th day of May, A. D. 1875.
