The Grangers of this place are contemplating the erection of a commodious Warehouse and granary at Dayton, having learned that it is better to store and wait good prices than to ship for themselves.

The suffering woman's convention is at an end and our village is once more tranquil. Mrs. Daniway lectured to a full house on last Friday evening and had it all her own way, though on the following evening by some of her strictures on Mr. Galloway's legislative record, in voting against the suffrage bill, and also the stand she took respecting a question which read: "Would not the elective franchise lessen woman's moral influence, also would she not, under the exercise of the suffrage right, become as intemperate and profane as men now are." The gentleman was induced to respond, which he did in a ten minute speech. He ridiculed the movement and stated in substance that he opposed it on moral and social grounds; held that it would unsex society and inaugurate an era of discord and contention most deplorable to behold. He thought the movers were persons of good character and well intended but mistaken in what they conceive to be their wrongs.

He also held that the woman could never vote only under constitutional amendments which would require six years. This opened the ball, and Dr. Nicklin spoke eloquently in favor of the rights of the fair sex, and concluded by placing himself emphatically on the side of the strong minded ladies. Others were called on and responded in well timed remarks, the majority of them being opposed to the movement.

The convention ended with an orthographical contest between the ladies and gentlemen which ended in a draw. To the credit of our village, he it said, everything passed pleasantly and with the best of feelings on all sides, and we shall long remember the choice music rendered by Mrs. Kelly and Miss Cooke of Lafayette. I had almost forgotten to mention the letter addressed to the woman convention and signed by B. W. Dann, blacksmith, North Yamhill. It certainly transcends anything that ever emanated from the brain of a white smith.

A cinnabar ledge has been discovered by Oliver Swingle in the canyon, Lake county, where Black Jim, the Modoc warrior, was captured.

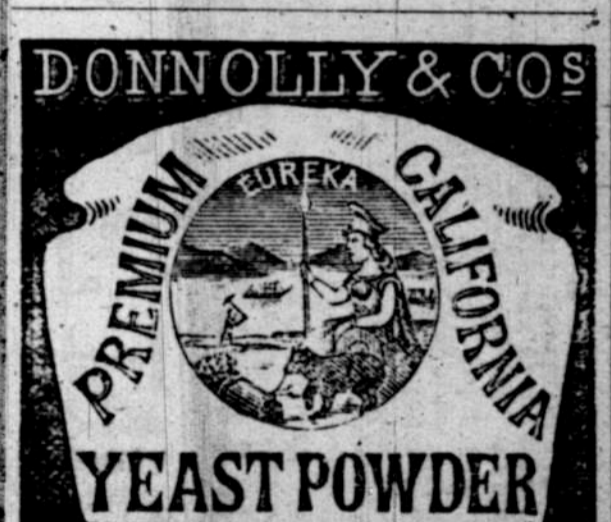
A few more ledges have been discovered in Southern Oregon. If the reports are correct, a man can discover a gold or cinnabar mine which or whenever he likes, out there.
