

WORK WILL BE PUSHED

Big Mill of C. A. Smith to be
Finished By The First of De-
cember.

USING ALL THE MEN

Available and the Site of the Plant
Is Getting to Be a Busy
Place.

Work on the big mill of the C. A. Smith company is being pushed as rapidly as possible. Most of that being done now is of a preliminary nature and does not show to the casual observer, but even now the mill site looks busy. A pile driver is there, and men are at work at the dock nearly opposite the Bay City mill.

The dock when finished will be a platform about 500 feet in length, and will be used in the unloading of lumber and material during the construction work. There are now several big pieces of machinery on the platform.

The big wharf which will be used for loading lumber when the plant is finished will be on the north side of the mill site. It will begin at the point at the east end and will extend on toward Marshfield, and will eventually reach as far as the coal bunkers. This big dock will be the place where the big loading is done. The present structure is largely to be used in the construction work.

Mr. Mitchell, the draftsman, who is working on the plans, will have his office moved over to the mill site as soon as a place can be provided for him. He is a mechanical engineer as well as a draftsman, and will be there to watch the work as it progresses. He is now making the ground plans to suit the machinery, and will later draw the elevation.

It is expected that the big mill will be finished by the first of December. This will be pushing matters, but if the company is not hampered by delay in the delivery of machinery the plant will probably be ready for operation at that time.

WANT GOVERNOR TO STAY

People of New Albuquerque Express
Views at Mass Meeting.

Albuquerque, N. M., April 25.—Three thousand people in a mass meeting united in a protest against the resignation of Governor Hagerman which was requested a week ago by President Roosevelt. Resolutions were adopted vigorously condemning W. H. Andrews, delegate to congress and United States Senator Lleweland, who were charged with responsibility for the agitation which resulted in the president's action. The resolutions state that it is the belief of the people that the president has been deceived as to Hagerman's actions and as to the state of public sentiment in the territory.

It was the consensus of opinion apparently that the ambassador should have thought twice before presenting to German society the promoter of the Newport monkey dinner and that sort of thing. Ambassador Tower, however, seems to have been vindicated, for Emperor William has dined with him since the episode. Mr. Tower is a Philadelphian, born in 1848. He has been a deep student of history and is the author of a two volume account of the part taken by the Marquis de Lafayette in the American Revolution.
