

PHONE FOR LIFE SAVERS

Will Be Extended From Station Across the Bay to Empire.

IS NOT CONNECTED

With the Regular Line and That Can Be Done by the Cities.

Telephone service will soon connect the Coos Bay life saving station with Empire. Captain Nelson recently received the equipment furnished by the government, and the work of installing it will at once begin. It will be necessary to secure a number of telephone poles before the line is completed, and it is thought they will be furnished by Coquille. Captain Nelson was unable to get any poles last week either in North Bend or Marshfield, and Coquille was resorted to.

Not Connected.
The government does not allow any money for the connection of the phone at this station with the local lines. From the life saving station the phone will cross the bay to the office of Mr. Shine, secretary of the Southern Oregon company. There will be a switch so that it will ring in his house at night. Those acquainted with conditions say the installing of the phone is one of the most valuable acquisitions the bay has ever secured. Many times in the past emergencies have arisen when the service was needed vitally, and as the harbor grows in commercial importance the telephone will be invaluable.

Up to Cities.
It is the belief that something should be done by the cities of North Bend and Marshfield to connect the telephone service on the peninsula with that at the station. The cost would be trivial, and the benefits accruing from the service would be unlimited. It is said to be the intention of the

government to eventually have the life saving stations on the coast between San Francisco and Seattle connected by telephone service.

OREGON APPLES AT THE EXPOSITION.

The Dalles Chronicle has the following to say regarding the exhibit of apples at the exposition:

"A move is on foot in Oregon to have a display of the excellent fruit raised in the state at the Jamestown exposition. It is not to be in favor of any special locality, but a state exhibit, to which all sections will contribute. While the general exhibit will be credited to Oregon, on each box will be the name of the orchardist and the locality where it was raised.

"The Hood River Commercial club has already taken to the matter and is planning to have an exhibit of apples, and it has been suggested that The Dalles make a general exhibit of various fruits, for no locality in Oregon is better prepared to give a diversified exhibit than this.

"A better investment could not be made, particularly this year, when the fruit in the east and south has been injured by frosts and the crop will be a failure. At such times people are dissatisfied and are more susceptible to the inducements offered in a climate where crops never fail. If an exhibit of our fruits is good at Portland and Seattle, where only those easterners who could afford to make the trip across the continent could see them, how much more effective where the very class Oregon is trying to induce to come to the west and settle here will have access to it. Dalles people who have visited former expositions have some idea of the attention such a display attracts."
