

WILL IGNORE THE FINDING

Southern Pacific Railroad To Disregard Decision of the Oregon State Commission

RECOURSE IN APPEAL

That Is the Only Chance Lumbermen Have To Get Rate Changed.

Portland, Ore., May 1.—The Southern Pacific company will disregard the finding of the state railroad commission that the rate on green lumber from valley points to San Francisco of five dollars a ton is excessive, and complaint will be made to the interstate commerce commission petitioning that the railroad company be ordered to reduce the rate. The state commission recently held a hearing at which both the lumber interests and the railroad were represented. Last Thursday it submitted its findings, unaccompanied by any order or threat, to the company.

The controversy being over the interstate rate, and state commission being without authority in the matter, the refusal of the railroad to accede to the finding leaves the state commission with appeal to the interstate commerce commission as the only recourse.

WILL TAKE NO PART

Germany Intends To Fight Shy of Foreign Relation Question.

Berlin, May 1.—There was a general debate in the Reichstag on Germany's foreign relations. Incidentally Andrew Carnegie's recent utter-

ance in reference to the decision of the issue of war and peace being in the hands of Emperor William, was criticised and classed as a distortion of facts. The speakers of various parties suggested to the chancellor that Germany should take no part in the discussion of the limitation armaments at the Hague peace conference. The chancellor replied that Germany did not object to letting the other powers discuss the matter but Germany would hold aloof.

REACHES HALF MILLION

Robbery of Atlantic Safe Deposit Was Great.

New York, May 1.—By securing the papers that had been locked in the vaults of the Atlantic Safe Deposit company, the district attorney's office today made material headway. It is believed an investigation of conspiracy through which the trust company of America was robbed of over half a million dollars. It was reported that the papers included much correspondence but nothing definite has been learned. Bennett and Douglass, who are in custody, were questioned at length.

Appeals to Emperor.

St. Petersburg, May 1.—Minister of War Rudiger went to Tsarskoe-Solo to report to Emperor Nicholas concerning the incidents in the Douma Monday. A rumor is in circulation that he has induced the emperor to dissolve the chamber because of the attacks on the army. A session of the cabinet tonight was occupied with ordinary business and one of the ministers said there is no doubt the Douma will reassemble on May 13.

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
