WANT TO BE ON THE LINE

Myrtle Point People Anxious That Electric Road Come Through That Place

SAY IT WOULD HELP

Not Only the Coquille Valley But Also Open a Fine Farming District.

(Times Special Service.)

Myrtle Point, May 3.—The people of this city have held a mass meeting for the purpose of getting expressions from the many interested parties about an electric railroad between Roseburg and Marshfield. The consensus of opinion is that if the road is built along one of the routes recently mentioned, which will extend through both Myrtle Point and Coquille, it will be a big thing and that they are willing to work tooth and nail for such a road but on the other hand if the other route mentioned is considered, thereby cutting off both Myrtle Point and

Coquille they are not in favor of the road.

The majority of the people think that Marshfield should do all in her power to have the road come through the two cities, on the grounds that the country through which the road would pass to touch these cities, is the backbone of the agriculture district of this county, while the other route is not through such a good district. They say Marshfield will be benefitted also by coming through Myrtle Point and Coquille as there will not only be more travel, but the fact that the road follows the Coquille river will add materially to the traffic in freight.

HAD NO INFLUENCE
