

COUNTY VOTES "WET"

Returns From All Around County Show Heavy Majority Over Last Liquor Election

"WETS" WIN COQUILLE

County Seat Against Prohibition by Margin of Forty-five Votes—Myrtle Point Dry.

CAST, 2,419. WET, 1,480. DRY, 939.

With but nine precincts to hear from and those the smallest in Coos County, it is a foregone conclusion, that this county has gone "wet" by the biggest vote and majority ever polled.

Around Coquille the battle raged all day with unabated fury, and when night came the vote showed the "wets" winner by one vote in East Coquille precinct and by forty-four votes in West Coquille precinct, the city going wet by a majority of forty-five votes.

That interest was at its height in Marshfield was manifested by the heavy increase over last year's vote.

The same was also true in North Bend. In Marshfield in 1906 a total of 364 votes were cast, while yesterday 586 were polled. In North Bend in 1906 a total of 302 votes were cast, and yesterday's election showed a total of 506 votes.

As was predicted all over the county, Myrtle Point went "dry," the majority for prohibition being 106 votes out of a total of 282 cast.

"ANOTHER TERM" SAYS BOURNE

States That Roosevelt Must Ultimately Submit to Unanimous Command of Citizens

WORK NOT COMPLETED

Oregon Senator Believes Chief Executive Has Not Yet Demonstrated People's Rights.

Senator Bourne has written a personal letter in which he encloses an interview with himself regarding Roosevelt's re-election:

"Efficiency as a public servant, recognition of the rights of all the people, anxiety to carry out their commands, are the true causes of the people's confidence in President Roosevelt, rather than any emotional affection for the man."

People Command, Not Ask.

"The people are not asking the President or any other individual what they shall do, but they are commanding the President as their chief public servant to carry out their wishes. The idea that the President is attempting, or will attempt, to designate to the nation who shall be his successor, is an insult to the intelligence, integrity, and independence of the citizenship of the nation, as well as to the President himself."

Can Rescind Declaration.

"The puerile claim advanced by the reactionaries that he cannot rescind his re-election declaration is untenable. His whole public life gives the lie to this claim. He will not place his own personal wishes and desires as paramount to the commands of the nation, nor does he possess such small mental or moral caliber as to prefer a mistaken consistency of purpose in adhering to a declaration given in 1904, rather than obedience to the commands of the people and requested patriotic service for our country's welfare. LIBBY MINER IS FATALLY CUT

John Kelly Plunges Knife Into William Wearn to Ward Off Latter's Attack

Both in Marshfield Kelly Gives Himself Up and Wearn Lies Dying in City General Hospital.

William Wearn, a coal miner at Libby, lies in the Marshfield Hospital, dying, as the result of knife wounds received Saturday night at the hands of John Kelly, also a coal miner employed at Libby.

Not wishing to precipitate a fight Kelly made no answer, but went out in the rear of the bunk house to gather up the remaining bottles of beer.

After the stabbing had occurred the two started down the road toward home, while Wearn went upstairs and woke his companion, telling him that he was seriously hurt.

Wearn has a mother, three sisters, and three brothers living in Nevada City, California. A telegram was sent his mother yesterday notifying her that her son had been seriously cut.

Kelly has two sisters and two brothers living in the vicinity of Coos Bay—Mrs. Bert Johnson, Libby; Mrs. Lizzie Bowron, Maxwell; Andy Kelly, Beaver Hill, and Tom Kelly, who works at Conlog's logging camp.

Wearn is about twenty-six years old and Kelly is thirty-two. Both have spent the greater part of their lives here.

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HAYWOOD JURY IS SELECTED

Today Will Witness the Opening Of Trial Of Alleged Conspirator Against Steunenberg

MANY CRIMES CHARGED

Includes Murders, Attempted Killings, and Mine Explosions—156 Talesmen Examined.

Boise, June 3.—The twelve men who are to try Haywood for his life on the charge that he murdered former Governor Frank Steunenberg has been chosen and bound by oath to honestly deal the laws of justice between the State and the prisoner.

The swearing of the jury was an impressive scene, as was the reading in the afternoon recess of the indictment charging Haywood, Moyer, Pettibone and Simpkins. Tomorrow morning James H. Hawley, for the State will address the court for the State's opening argument, and it is expected the address will be comparatively short.

Broadly speaking, the State will charge that Haywood and his associates Moyer, Pettibone, Simpkins and others planned the long list of crimes, including the explosion at the Vindicator mine, the blowing up of the Independent, the murder of Detective Light Gregory, Denver; the murder of Archie Collins, the alleged blowing up of Frank Bradley in San Francisco, and the alleged attempts on the lives of former Governor Peabody, Judges Gebbert and Goddard in Colorado and the murder of Steunenberg.

It is to be charged that Haywood is the genius behind the plot; that Steunenberg was added to the list because of his part in the labor trouble. In the work of securing the Haywood jury the court was in session fifteen days and one hundred and fifty-six talesmen were examined; of this number 34 qualified, including the twelve on in the box.

Juror Cole was excused because of sickness, and Tourtelotte on account of opposition to capital punishment. The jury consists of eight Republicans, three Democrats, one Prohibitionist, nine farmers, one real estate agent, one building contractor and one foreman of fence construction on a railroad. There is no man on the jury who works for wages, and but one who ever belonged to a labor union (fourteen years ago) who has ever been a student in trades unionism. Peter Breene, an attorney of Butte, has joined the defense.

PORTLAND RETURNS.

Portland, June 4.—Election returns at 1 o'clock this morning from every section of the city by the Oregonian indicate the election of Dr. Harry Lane, Democrat and Independent, over Thomas Devlin, Republican, for mayoralty, and about 600 or 1,000 majority. Devlin is believed to have carried the "West Side" by about 1,000. The Oregonian figures are admittedly uncertain, but a certain ratio followed from each precinct warrants the figures given above.
