ANOTHER BOAT  
TO PORTLAND

Steamer Breakwater To Ply Exclusively Between Coos Bay And Columbia River

## SERVICE BADLY NEEDED

Shippers Believe at Present Increase Required Soon.

Reports from the San Francisco offices of the Steamer Breakwater are to the effect that the boat will discontinue to run between Coos Bay and San Francisco when she leaves dry dock, but will make the run from Coos Bay to Portland on weekly schedule. This will give the Bay three boats between this port and Portland, and only the steamer Plant to handle the trade from San Francisco. The heavy portion of the shipping in the past few months has been from Portland, and with the steamers Breakwater, Alliance and Kilburn to handle it the situation here will be materially relieved. There is no doubt in the minds of local shippers but that the business at the rate it is growing will soon be even more than the three boats can handle.

The report printed a few days ago to the effect that the Southern Pacific steamer Czarina was going to be put on regularly between Coos Bay and Portland, gives the Bay people four boats from here to that port. The date of putting the Czarina on regular was not given, although it was intimated she would commence on her new schedule not later than the latter part of the summer.

## SOUNDING COLUMBIA

Believed That Increased Depth In Channel Will Be Found as Result of Work.

Bar soundings are now being taken at the mouth of the Columbia river, and it is believed that an increased depth will be found. Colonel Roessler, engineer officer in charge of the work, is unable to give exact figures until the survey has been completed. As great a depth as 28 feet has been reported in the south channel, but this is not confirmed by the engineers. The bar pilots, who always contend that the engineers report more water than actual soundings, insist that there is not more than 22 feet at low tide.

The deeper channel is the result of the jetty extension, which is yet only partly completed. The good results give assurance that a further extension of the jetty and the future construction of the proposed north jetty will bring further depth.

Notices to mariners will be issued today from the office of the inspector of the 13th lighthouse district, to the effect that the buoys marking the entrance to the Columbia river will be shifted to the south channel without notice, provided that the survey now being conducted by the government shows a sufficient depth of water to warrant the change.

Brings 270 Tons Freight and Thirty-Four Passengers—Rough Trip Reported.

The steamer M. F. Plant arrived from San Francisco yesterday with a cargo of 270 tons of general freight and a passenger list of thirty-four. Among the special pieces of freight the most important were several large machines for the new C. A. Smith Lumber and Manufacturing Company mill.
