Floating Logs.—The testimony taken Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in Coquille in the case of Moon and Flinn vs. McDonald and Vaughn involving the question of the right to boat logs in the North Fork of the Coquille above the Moon property by use of dams included testimony of 25 witnesses. The case will come up before Judge Hamilton at the September term of the Circuit Court.

Mrs. J. W. Bennett Leaves.—Mrs. J. W. Bennett will leave today on the steamer Plant for San Francisco, where she will visit with her parents, from which place she will go to Los Angeles to visit her sister, who is in bad health. Mrs. Bennett will be accompanied by Miss Kathleen Bennett, daughter of G. A. Bennett, who will visit with her grandmother in Southern California and with friends in Santa Rosa for the next two months.

Accident to Foot.—Rudolph Kaino, a young man working for Anson Rogers at his ranch in Cois river, met with a bad accident yesterday forenoon while working near a man chopping wood. The ax glanced in such a manner as to sever an artery on the instep of his left foot. The wound bled considerably in spite of the efforts of those with him to stop the flow. The accident happened about 11:15, and it was after 2 o'clock before he could be brought to a doctor in Marshfield.

Bunker Hill Owner.—Miss Florence Mullen, of San Francisco, who has been visiting relatives and friends on the Bay for some time, will return on the steamer Plant today. She is an owner in the Bunker Hill property, from whom the Flanagan estate and the C. A. Smith Lumber and Manufacturing Company secured the site for their new mill. Miss Mullen will return to the Bay in about a month.

State Examination.—The State examination of the eighth grade students was commenced yesterday in the Marshfield school. There are 18 students in the local school taking the examination, and in addition four from Willanch Slough. The final examinations in both the high school and the grades will be started presently.

Funeral Today.—The body of the late Mrs. Sarah King, who died at

her home in Coquille Wednesday, will be buried this afternoon in the Marshfield Cemetery. The services will be conducted at the Lutheran church, Rev. B. F. Bengston officiating, the funeral to take place at 2 o'clock.

Coos Bay Shipments.—The Coos Bay Creamery has a shipment of 400 cheeses and 2,176 pounds of butter on the Plant to be shipped to San Francisco.

The firm of Helming & Raines has a shipment of 900 hides on the Plant billed to a San Francisco firm. This is probably the largest shipment of hides ever made from Coos Bay.
