Oregon is becoming the Mecca of eastern homeseekers, and every day a steady stream of prospective residents is flowing toward the State. Officials of the board of trade, chamber of commerce, Portland Commercial Club and other similar organizations state that an average of seven letters a day is received by each secretary telling either of arrivals in or departure for Oregon by families who have arranged to settle permanently in the State. These letters consist only of a small portion of the actual number of those who are being received. The letters are sent as the result of advertisements distributed by the different organizations or of personal letters or visits.

Using these figures as a basis from which to figure it is estimated that fully 25,000 families will have settled is Oregon during the current year. All those, or nearly all, who come into communication with the commercial bodies are seeking farms and ranches and many go into the interior of the State to find their homes. The Willamette valley and the other sections are thus receiving a steady influx of settlers and reports from every district tell of more rapid settlement at the present time than ever before in the history of the State.
