**STARTS NEW BANK**

Present Buildings Are To Be Removed For Stone and Brick Structure.

The latter part of this week will witness a change in the appearance of the corner of Broadway and C streets, when the buildings now standing will begin to make room for progress in the building of a fine stone and brick bank structure which is soon to grace that corner. The old buildings will either be torn down or moved away at once that the construction of a large basement to be under the entire building can be excavated as soon as possible.

The material for the new building has almost all been contracted for. Even the interior fixtures of the bank have been ordered and will be here in a short time. The first story of the building will be constructed of stone while the second story will be concrete with a pressed brick front on both Broadway and C streets. It is thought this will be one of the finest appearing buildings in the city. The C street side of the 100 by 100 foot structure is to be divided in such a manner that besides the bank there will be two large store rooms, while on the Broadway side there will be but two store rooms. The second floor will be divided into thirty fine offices. The walls of the structure are to be made extra heavy that two more stories may be added to the building at any time the owners deem it necessary.

The building will be constructed under the supervision of Ed. Perham, said to be one of the best men in his line in the country.

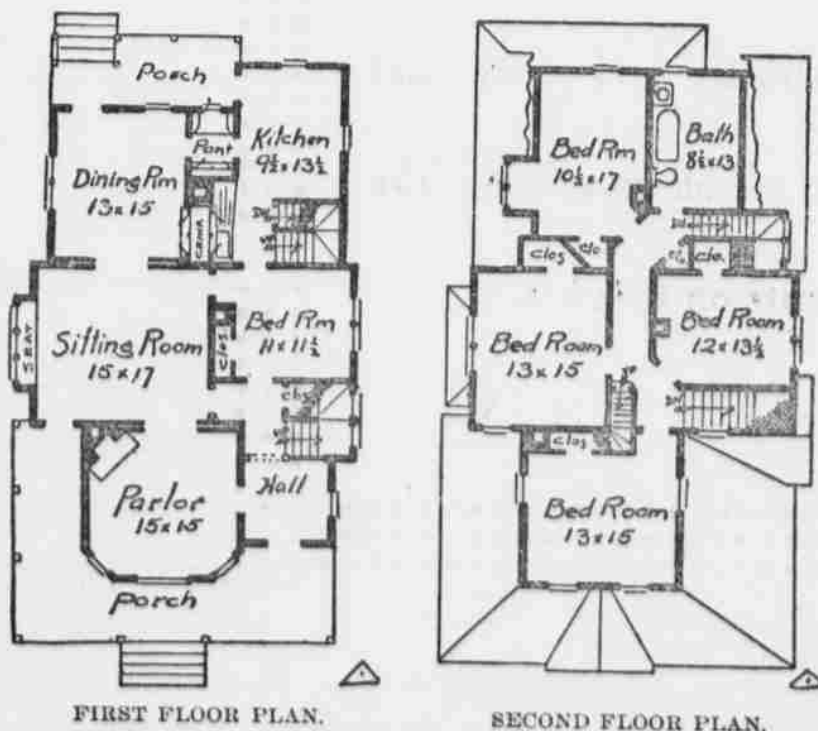
**Handsome Frame House.**

**CAPTAINS UNCERTAIN**

Owing to Troubles In San Francisco Belief Exists That Shipping Will Fall Off.

Several captains of sailing vessels coming to Coos Bay are asking themselves the question of what they will find for their vessels to do this coming winter. Some of them say that the San Francisco lumber market is flooded far in excess of what can be used in several months, owing to the present peculiar conditions. The concerns shipping lumber to the city since the earthquake have put every vessel it was safe to use into the lumber carrying trade, making the transportation facilities of the coast much in advance of what ordinary conditions demand, with the result that now the demand is gone, a great many vessels are unable to find

freight to carry. Another and more serious reason is the labor troubles tying up all construction work. The wharves of a great many docks are piled high with lumber enough to last for several months no matter how much building may be done.

The strikes in San Francisco not only tied up the work temporarily but had a tendency to keep a great many from building who would, were it not for the unusual high prices which prevail for all kinds of material and labor. The price however on lumber is decreasing, although it continued to rise for several months after the disaster, until it reached the high water mark at over twice what the prices had been. It is said that now some of the lumber bought at the extremely high prices is being sold at less than half the buying price.

**DEED TO RACE TRACK**

W. S. Chandler received word yesterday from his wife who is in Portland attending to business relating to the sale of the Irvington Race Track property, to the effect that a deed to the property would be given to the Multnomah Fair Association for the consideration of \$150,000 as per agreement made several years ago. The property is now valued at \$500,000, but as an agreement was made at the time of leasing the property that it could be bought for \$150,000, the present value cuts no figure in the transaction.

The present owners made a fight for the property on the ground that the racing association violated its part of the lease by allowing gambling to go on at the grounds. The property is now decidedly too valuable for racing purposes and will probably be cut into lots and sold by the new owners.
