#### STARTS BANK

Present Buildings Are To Be Removed For Stone and Brick Structure.

The latter part of this week will witness a change in the appearance of the corner of Broadway and C streets, when the buildings now standing will begin to make room for progress in the building of a fine stone and brick bank structure which is soon to grace that corner, The old buildings will either be torn down or moved away at once that the construction of a large basement to be under the entire building can be excavated as soon as possible.

The material for the new building has almost all been contracted for. Even the interior fixtures of the bank have been ordered and will be here In a short time. The first story of the building will be constructed of stone while the second story will be concrete with a pressed brick front on both Broadway and C streets. It is thought this will be one of the finest appearing buildings in the city. The C street side of the 100 by 100 foot structure is to be divided in such a manner that bosides the bank there will be two large store rooms, while on the Broadway side there will be but two store rooms. The second floor will be divided into thirty fine offices. The walls of the structure are to be made extra heavy that two more stories may be added to the building at any time the owners deem it necessary.

The building will be constructed under the supervision of Ed. Perham, said to be one of the best men in his line in the country.


