WORK STARTS IMMEDIATELY

Further Confirmation of Southern Pacific Road's Intention Regarding Coos Bay Country

MORE STEAMSHIPS

Coos Bay-Portland Line Will Be Established by Placing Czarina and Breakwater.

Additional confirmation to the stories printed in the Times regarding the movements of the Southern Pacific now come from Portland. The Oregonian prints the picture of J. J. Mills, who is to take charge of the Southern Pacific interests in Coos Bay on July 1, acting in the capacity of general manager and president of the local railroad and general manager of the Portland-Coos Bay Steamship company. Following is the Oregonian article:

J. J. Mills, livestock agent for the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, has been made general manager of the Southern Pacific interests on Coos Bay. E. E. Calvin, general manager for the Southern Pacific at San Francisco, made the appointment which becomes effective July 1.

Mr. Mills will go to Marshfield as president and general manager of the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Railroad Company and the Coos Bay Steamship Company. The main line runs from Coos Bay to Coquille and Myrtle Beach, a distance of 31 miles, with a branch to Beaver Hill, where coal mines are in operation. The road carries an immense tonnage of logs and besides serving the general public. The property was acquired by the Harriman interests a few months ago by purchase from the Oregonian interests.

The Portland & Coos Bay Steamship Company is a new line which will begin operation in July. The new Breakwater, which has formerly run between San Francisco and Coos Bay, will hereafter run to Marshfield from the Coos Bay country. The first trip will be made next week. An additional steamer, the "Czarina," will be placed on the run in July. The "Czarina" is a freighter and will be a large coal carrier.

Mr. Mills is one of the best known officials of the Harriman lines in the Portland headquarters. He has been livestock agent for the past 15 years.

For eight years before he accepted this position, he was joint agent for the Oregon Short Line and the Great Northern at Huntington.

He began his railroad career in 1889, where he was born in 1859, as a messenger boy in the dispatch office of the Old Tioga railroad. In 1891 he was in the general passenger agent's office at
