#### MARSHFIELD MAN PERFECTS INVENTION

Daniel Flory Designs Car Stake for Logging Trains---Eliminates Much Danges

What is said to be one of the most interesting and practical inventions has just been patented by Daniel GEO. D. GRAY & CO., General agente, Flory of Marshfield, Oregon. The invention is an improved car-stake, and consists of a set of hollow metal stakes, square in form, mounted along the sides of a log car in such a manner as to be perfectly free to move up or down in the mounting frames. Each of the stakes has a vertical series of holes right through the inner side of the square and a small toothed wheel is mounted directly back of each stake so that its teeth will enter the holes in the stake. These wheels are all keyed to a shaft running lengthwise of the car so that when the shaft is turned in one direction or the other the stakes are all raised or lowered.

The shaft can be locked at the end so as to hold the stakes at any desired hieght. The stakes are so designed that they are thoroughly practical in all ways. Slivers and pieces of bark cannot interfere with its action or clog up the hores which are engaged by the toothed wheel because the holes extend through the side of the stake and the teeth of the wheel simply forces them through the holes and they fall to the ground through the middle part of the stake. They are said to have many desirable points which are readily appreciated by those familiar with the present crude, dangerous, and expensive methods of staking log cars.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is said to be working on a law requiring railroads to supply the loggers with cars having some means which will reduce the dangers incident to the handling of logs by the present methods, and one point which will be incidentally accomplished by the adoption of a stake, such as Mr. Flory has patented, will be the saving in the expense the wood for the present stakes, the cost of trimming the stakes for the sockets, and the cost of unloading the logs from the cars by the present
