Portland business men have in contemplation an excursion covering about twenty-five points in Northwestern Oregon and Western Washington, July 24-28.

DAY CURRENT PROVES POPULAR

Inauguration of the daylight circuit by the electric light company has been a boon to a number of local firms which required power. The innovation was adopted on the first of the month, and since that date the following persons or firms have been operating with electric motors: The Times Publishing Company, three motors; Thomas Howard, Jeweler, one motor; Coos Bay Publishing Co., one motor; L. W. Shaw, one motor for pumping water; Henry Holm, one motor for driving his sausage machine. No change has been made as yet with reference to consumers in private homes and business buildings, and the company trusts the public to use the lights only at such times as it is necessary.

However, a daylight current is bound to create a demand for a more extensive consumption, for when the shorter days arrive many will use electricity earlier in the day than when the night current was the only dependence. Mr. Blanchard, of the company, explained to the Times reporter that he could keep tabs on patrons and has a system of switches by which he can circumvent any unnecessary waste.

NO DEVELOPMENTS IN PALM ROBBERY

Proprietors Offer Reward of \$10--Kindsley To Be Taken To County Jail

No developments have come to light regarding the robbery in the Palm Monday night last. Dr. Stafford when interviewed said that while the loss of the revolver was regretted no ill feelings were held toward the thief. The latter overlooked the ammunition belonging to the gun and this will be given him on request. The proprietors of the ice cream par-
