ANDREWS CASE PATHETIC.

LITTLE GIRL PROTESTS JURY'S DECISION.

Cried That He Had Kicked Her and Fought Against Going With Him.

Attorney Thomas Hall, who was senior counsel in the Andrews guardian case heard at Coquille the forepart of the week, reports that there was considerable disappointment at the county seat over the result of the trial and that the sympathy of the Coquille people was largely with Miss Ferrey, who was trying to obtain control of the little girl.

A particularly pathetic incident occurred after the trial, according to Mr. Hall, when the father of the girl took her from the court room. The little child was fearful of the usage she would get at home and screamed and fought against going with Andrews. She cried that he had kicked her a dozen times and said she would not go with him.

She accused him of lying on the witness stand and seemed in deepest despair that she was obliged to return to the scene of her unhappiness. Mr. Hall further stated that the evidence was conclusive and how the jury found as it did was a mystery to Miss Ferrey's counsel and to the general public.
