room, two bath rooms, a small and a large ward, ten single rooms for surgical patients, and a large balcony.

On the third floor is the chapel and Sisters' dormitory, nurses' apartments and two bath rooms.

The entire building is lighted by electricity, heated by steam and furnished with hot and cold water.

The sanitary conditions are perfect, the furniture is modern, and no effort to furnish all that is necessary seems to have been spared by the progressive people of the Bay.

All this has been accomplished mainly by the exertions of Father Donnelly, the Sisters and charitable donations. There can be no question that the appropriations have been wisely and faithfully applied as a visit to the hospital will attest.
