Brings On 340 Tons of Freight—Makes Run From Portland In Seventeen Hours.
The Alliance arrived in from Portland yesterday morning and is discharging her cargo. She spent the forenoon at North Bend and was unloading at the wharf in Marshfield in the afternoon. Today she will unload a large quantity of freight at the C. A. Smith mills. The Alliance made good time on this trip, leaving Portland at eight o'clock Wednesday night, and arriving at Coos Bay bar at two o'clock yesterday morning. Her time between bars was seventeen hours. MARSHFIELD IS THE YOUNG MAN'S TOWN

So Described by Harry Tremain, a Recent Coos Bay Visitor.
"The Young Man's Town" of the Pacific Coast, is the way H. G. Tremain describes Marshfield, on Coos Bay, the main port between Puget Sound and San Francisco, and the center of one of the finest lumber regions in Oregon, says the Bellingham Herald, of Bellingham, Washington. He states that with all the influx of people from the eastern part of the country, the young men, ranging from 20 to 30 years of age, are taking the lead in all forms of industrial life. At the present time one of the biggest lumber mills on the coast is in course of construction and will be completed before the beginning of next year. Additional coal mines are being opened near Marshfield and overhauled apparently is prosperous. When the sawmill is completed it will have a cutting capacity of 500,000 feet a day. One thing that impressed Mr. Tremain very much was the spirit of progress and fraternity among the people.
