

MANY ORDERS AT CREAMERY

Coos Bay Industry Handles But Small Portion of Business.

WILL ENLARGE CAPACITY

Brick Plant Work Progresses—Other News From Up Coos River.

The prospects of the Coos Bay Creamery are unusually bright this season. Not only is the demand for butter unusually good, but so great is the demand for cheese that the creamery is able to fill only a small part of the orders received. There are on hand at present orders for over twenty-nine hundred cases of cheese, and the company is continually receiving more.

It is the intention of the management to install a new cheese vat as soon as possible, that they may be able to supply the growing demand for the finished product.

LOOKS AFTER ENFORCEMENT OF LAW

Counties of Linn and Lane May Be Quarantined For Evading Sheep Dipping Law.

A government official connected with the bureau of animal industry made a visit to Salem regarding the enforcement of the law requiring the dipping of all sheep in the state. He reported that the law is being pretty generally complied with in all counties of the state except Lane and Linn, where the farmers and sheep raisers seem inclined to evade it. This official has used his utmost endeavors to get the raisers in these counties to see the benefits of dipping, but it seems without success. He declared that the failure to observe the law will in all likelihood result in the federal authorities quarantining the two counties, allowing no sheep to be taken out or brought in. This will work a hardship on many of the raisers of sheep and those who deal in them.

Lane county is one of the best sheep raising sections of Western Oregon, and while a majority of the sheep are perhaps free from disease, all of them should be dipped according to law so that it will not be necessary to establish a quarantine. Frank Armitage, of Salem, was some time ago appointed deputy state sheep inspector for that county, and he has done all he could to have the law complied with, but has met with poor success. While some of the sheep have been dipped a great many more have not been, and in many cases the animals are badly infected with scab.

SALMON SEASON OPENED JULY 15

Heavy Run Will Not Occur Till August On Coos Bay.

The salmon season opened on Monday, the 15th, but on Coos Bay there has been no flurry. The real and heavy run of chinook takes place along in August in this region and on the Coquille. None of the canneries are expecting anything of a run now and in fact, neither of the Bandon canneries are prepared to take care of any fish.

Mr. Timmons, of Astoria, is at Bandon overseeing improvements and looking after orders which must be filled before the salmon are handled. Editor Bennett, of the Coos Bay News, informed the Times reporter that salmon have been in Coos river for two or three months, but no large number have been seen. The Palace restaurant was the first house to exhibit a chinook since the season opened.

NEW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AT EUGENE

Building Will Be Constructed of Stone and Will Cost About \$18,000.

Architect John Hunzicker is completing the plans for the new house of worship to be erected by the Central Presbyterian church in Eugene at the corner of East Tenth and Pearl streets, and if adopted by the congregation they will be ready for the contractors to figure on in about two weeks. The building will be completed some time this fall.

The church will be far the costliest and the most commodious in the city. It will be built of stone and will cost \$18,000 or over. It will seat approximately 1,100 people, which is a hundred or more greater than the seating capacity of the largest church building in the city at present.

The new edifice will be Gothic in design, a general description of it being as follows: The dimensions over all will have a seating capacity of 380, seven Sunday school rooms adjoining the auditorium and which are connected with it by folding doors, will seat 350 and the gallery on three sides of the auditorium will seat 340.—Eugene Guard.
