The Southern Oregon Company is the present owner of the land granted to the old Coos Bay Wagon Road Company, which was granted a strip of Bay, a distance of about 65 miles.

T. S. Minot, a lawyer of San Francisco, is in Portland in the interests of a large number of applicants for the land, and has prepared a bill of complaint and information showing that his clients made legal application for the land and asking that the courts compel the company to sell. Mr. Minot has submitted all the papers which contain the evidence he has gathered against the company to Burdette D. Townsend assistant United States attorney, who was sent out from North Dakota several weeks ago as the representative of Attorney-General Bonaparte in all Oregon land grant matters. In discussing the situation today, Mr. Minot said:

"This action is brought to compel the company to sell its lands at \$2.50 an acre, which it has refused to do. The land is valuable for grazing purposes and diversified farming. Its timber resources are wonderful. Some of the land will run 15,000,000 feet to the quarter section.

"We have made application for the land and the names of 110 applicants appear in this complaint which I have submitted to Mr. Townsend. When we visited the offices of the company at Empire City, with more than \$100,000 to pay for the land, our applications were turned down by R. E. Shine, secretary of the company, who ordered us out of his We showed our papers, offered \$1,000 in payment for each section, \$400 for the land and the rest for taxes which the company has paid since it secured the grant. This made a legal tender and will be good evidence in the courts.


