Former Coos Bay Newspaper Man Writes From Insane Asylum.

TREATMENT AN OUTRAGE

Says He Was Never In Sounder Mental Condition During His Lifetime.

To following letter is from the pen of George Wallace Williams, well known around Coos Bay and vicinity, and who was recently taken in custody at Bandon and adjudged insane: Salem, Ore., July 15, 1907.

My Dear Friend:—Your letter of the 9th was the first that I received since leaving Marshfield. For some reason they had me arrested at Bandon, July 5th, and thrown into the U. S. prison, which has a beautiful view of the jetty and light house. From there I was taken the next day to Coquille. How long I was there I do not know exactly as the strain of false imprisonment was beginning to tell on me. I was taken before Probate Judge Hall and given what they called a trial. I was refused the only witness I asked, Mr. Orville Dodge, editor of the Coquille Valley Sentinel, who is my personal friend, and knows my case exactly. By certain physicians' testimony, I am told, that I was adjudged insane; which is an outrage, for I never was of sounder mind in my life. I may have appeared insane to those who did not understand me. The Sacred Scripture say: "A fool uttereth all his thoughts." A modern adage has it: "Silence is golden." The worst that my enemies could say of me was that I was a fool.

Two guards called to take me to Salem. They proved true friends: Major Richard Young and Gen. H. H. Herman. Had they left me at the Bridge where the hotel has a better table of plain food and berries than the Waldorf-Astoria, or at Fitz Hugh's country home, I would be completely restored by this time.

The Superintendent of the State home is one of the kindest men I have met, but the table shocks the nerves of a sensitive person who found his sister Mary's cooking much better than that of the Hotel Portland.

A thousand thanks for friends' greeting and sympathy. I prize your letter more than I can ever tell you.
