SEOUL TERRORIZED BY RIOTING
Tokol, July 21.—Late advices from Seoul say the rioting is growing in magnitude. Attempts to burn the railway station and police building were frustrated by the prompt action of the Japanese police and gendarmes. The powder magazine of the Korean government is strongly

guarded by Japanese troops at the request of the Minister of War. Rioters are shooting wildly out of windows and two Japanese are reported killed. Murderous assaults are frequent and the city is verging almost on a reign of terror. Business is completely suspended.
