

# SALOONS WILL BE CLOSED UP

### Thirty-Two of Portland's Grogeries Come Under Ban of Local Option Law.

### TEN DAYS' GRACE GIVEN

#### District Attorney Issues Edict As Result of Queer Discovery Made by the Reformers.

Notice will be served this morning on the proprietors of all saloons in precincts 40, 55, 56 and 57 that they must suspend business within the next 10 days in compliance with the prohibition order voted under the local option law at the city election in 1905, says the Portland Oregonian. That the order of the county court enforcing prohibition in these precincts was never recorded in the journal of the court and that the saloons have been operating illegally for the past two years has just been discovered and District Attorney Manning will today serve notice ordering them to close.

There are 29 saloons in the precincts that will be affected by the order of the district attorney, and all these must close their doors. There are also three saloons in precinct 58 that will be forced to close. This is due to the fact that these saloons were included in precinct 57 at the time the vote was taken, but are now outside of it owing to a change in boundaries.

The discovery that the prohibition vote of 1905 had never been put into effect in the four precincts named was made by Rev. G. L. Tufts, of the Pacific Coast District of the Reform Bureau. After obtaining a new order from the county court covering the district, he called attention to the situation at a meeting in the Forbes Presbyterian church Sunday night. At this meeting a committee was appointed to take up the matter and this committee waited on District Attorney Manning yesterday morning.

As a result of this conference, Deputy District Attorney Adams made a thorough inspection of the records of the election. It was found that the county court had issued an order June 23, 1905, directing that the saloons close in compliance with the vote. This order, however, was never recorded in the journal of the court. Consequently it was never brought to the attention of the city license department, or of the district attorney, and so far as is known, the saloons were never notified to close their doors.

When this matter was called to the attention of the court three

weeks ago, a nunc pro tunc order was made directing the saloons to close. In compliance with this order a deputy of the district attorney's office will today serve notice on the proprietors of these saloons. Mr. Manning said last night that he would give them 10 days in which to wind up their affairs and go out of business.

No one seems to know how it happened that the order of the court was not recorded. County Clerk Fields is out of the city and could not be interviewed in connection with the matter.

The closing of these saloons will mean a reduction of \$24,800 a year in the revenue of the city. It is not believed that the licenses can be transferred to other locations and the number of saloons in the city will therefore be reduced from 439 to 408. Under the new license law it will be impossible to increase this number until the official census of the city shows more than 500 people for every saloon doing business.

### Southern Oregon Land Company Offers Two Lots to Marshfield.

## COUNCIL HOLDS SESSION

### Passes Ordinances For the Improvement of Sheridan Street and Pennsylvania Avenue.

The city council held an adjourned meeting last night to pass two ordinances, 178 and 179, for the improvement of Sheridan street from Washington to Pennsylvania avenue, and of Pennsylvania avenue from Sheridan street to Coal Bank Slough, to a point approaching the proposed bridge across the slough. These were passed and bids will be advertised for immediately, the time limit for the completion of each extension being sixty days.

It was stated that Mr. Perham, who secured the contract for improving Broadway and E streets, had not filed his bond, and on motion the contract was let to Masters & McLain, the next lowest bidders.

The resignation of Councilman F. P. Norton was read, and on motion was accepted. The mayor stated he had been too busy to select a man for the vacancy and would take more time for it.

A communication was read from R. E. Shine, stating that the Southern Oregon Company would give the city two lots, 40 and 41 in Block 9, New Bedford Addition, for a water reservoir site, a strip 50x110 feet, and in return would expect the city to dedicate a strip of 6x390 feet north of the old cemetery for the purpose of opening Second street. The communication was placed on file.

The matter of the Cedar street bridge in the northern part of the city was discussed and Mr. Hisner, employed by the County Court, said

he had torn the bridge planking off and found that the framework was unsafe. Also that he had no right, as an employee of the county, to proceed with rebuilding it, as the city had passed an ordinance of improvement, extending into the territory spanned by the bridge.

Mayor Straw called the attention of the council to the fact that complaints were made that the Pacific States Telephone Company was using more poles and guy wires in a certain portion of the city than allowable, and it was ordered that the company be required to remove such.

The mayor also brought several other items to the attention of the council, which he said he was powerless to correct, for the reason that there are no ordinances covering them. Among these were: flushing sewers, disposition of garbage, terra cotta and stove pipes extending through roofs. On motion of Flanagan, a committee was appointed to purchase a suitable garbage dumping ground for the city. This committee consists of Messrs. Flanagan, Lockhart and Condron.
