Marshfield is not well equipped to go against any team, but she is showing better work this week in practice, and may surprise the North Bend boys, who have come to believe it is a game to her credit when she meets Marshfield.

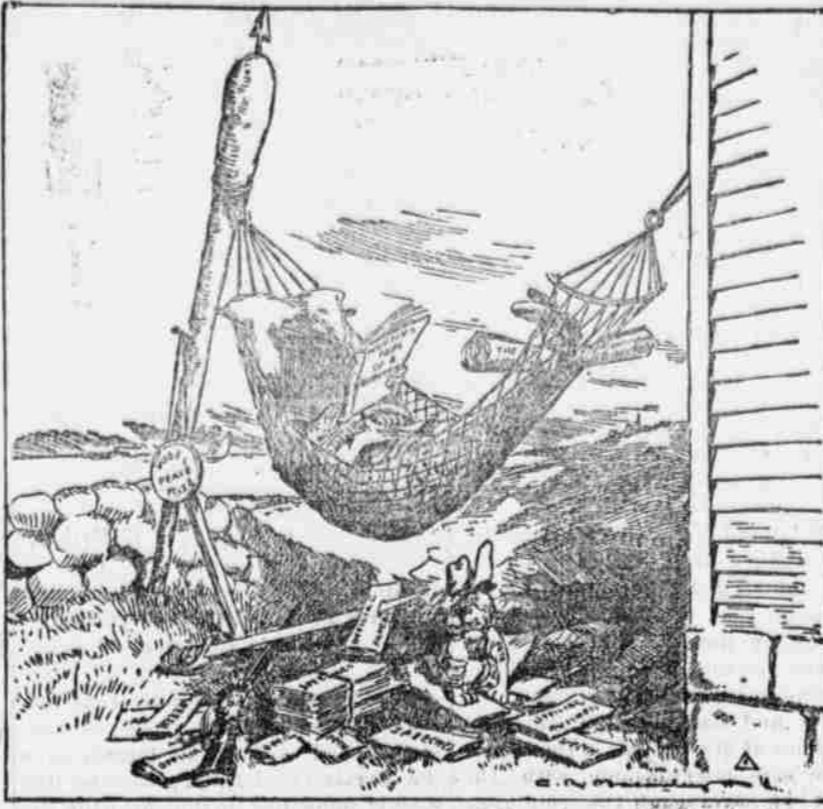

R. R. MEN ESCAPE THE LAW.

North Carolina Rate Bill Declared To Be Unconstitutional.

Asheville, N. C., July 26.—Federal Judge Pritchard today discharged Ticket Agents Wood and Wilson of the Southern Railway on habeas corpus proceedings, and declared the penalty of the new rate bill unconstitutional. Wood and Wilson were recently sentenced to thirty days upon the chain gang for violation of the law. In his decision Judge Pritchard said the penalties inflicted by the statute would close the doors to a judicial hearing and would amount to \$2,500,000 a day if the penalty was enforced upon the sale of each ticket, which is eight times more than the amount involved in the original suit.
