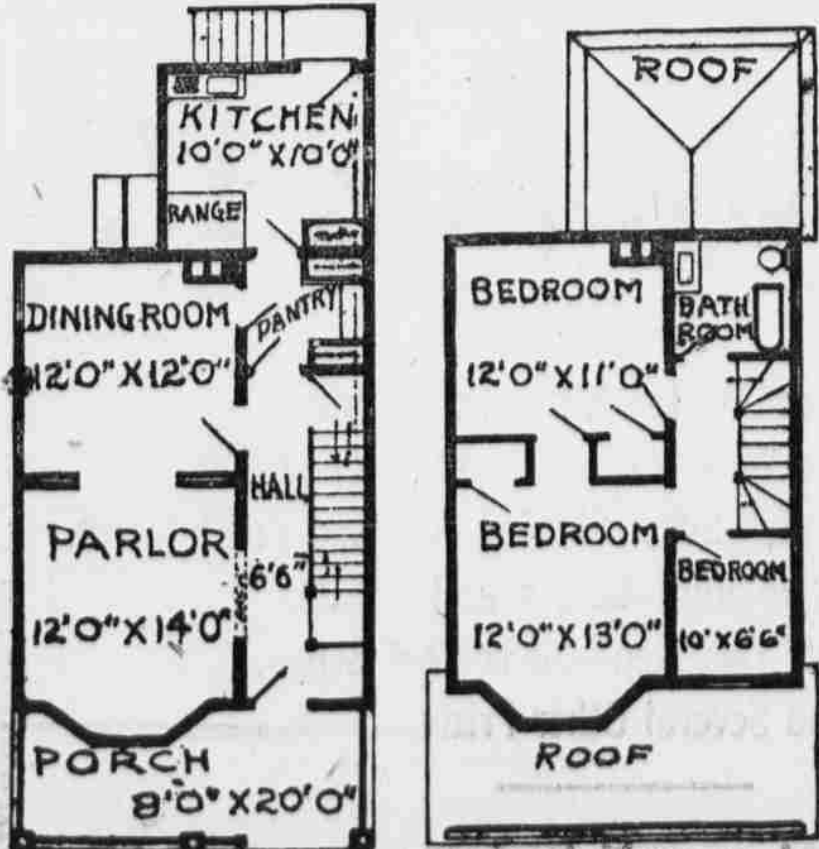
Suburban Residence.
