REMOVING RAILS TO BANDON FOR JETTY

William Wakefield, of the firm of Jacobson & Wakefield, who are putting in the new jetty at Bandon, was here this week to remove the rails from the government pier at the entrance to Coos Bay, for removal to Bandon. There were two scow loads of the rails which are now at the Southern Pacific depot waiting shipment to Cedar Point, and transfer at that place to boats bound for Bandon.
