

BANDON NOTES.

(Recorder.)

Last Sunday evening at 5 o'clock, the doors of the new Vienna Cafe and Bakery were thrown open to the public. A turkey dinner was served to patrons from that hour until 7:30, and the Seaside orchestra furnished music for the occasion from the balcony built in the rear of the dining room.

Geo. P. Laird is having a building 10 by 40 feet erected on his lot formerly occupied by the old livery stable. It will be two stories high, and the work is being rapidly pushed so as to have it ready for occupancy as soon as possible for C. A. Jamison, who will open up a saloon down stairs, and use the upper story for residence purposes.

The finance committee of the Bandon Development Association have been busy this week and over \$200 have been subscribed to advertise the town to the outside world. The advertising committee have already sent photographs to the engravers for halftones to be used in a descriptive booklet, and a back for envelopes is being made. This back will be printed on all of the envelopes of the business men free of charge by the association. It will in a condensed way state what we have and what we want in this fertile valley, and will be read by countless business and moneyed interests who are looking for opportunities to invest profitably.

A first class high school for Bandon is necessary and the growth of the city will warrant the provision of such an educational institution inside of another year. The school house problem is exactly where it was a year ago. The old buildings will have to be used again this year, as the proposed new buildings are still on paper. When the board does get ready to have the new buildings erected, provisions should be made for a convenient laboratory and a lecture room. The additional requirements for a twelve graded school is not much more than for the ten grades. A large assembly room is essential, and a couple of extra class rooms will be all that is required. Many parents have to send their children away to school who much rather they would finish their high school education at home. A good many can not afford to pay tuition and board, and consequently their education must be neglected after they have finished the ten grades, at least until they can themselves provide means to pay for their schooling elsewhere. A high school in Bandon will bring students from all along the river here. In building the new educational structures this next year, let the school board arrange for the additional rooms and provide for instructors that will keep the standard of this school up to that of any in the state. Inside of a few years the enrollment will be doubled and by all means let the educational interests keep pace with the advancement of the town.

MINNEAPOLIS TO GULF BY ELECTRIC POWER

Company Chartered With \$50,000,000 Capital to Build to Galveston—Double Track.

Guthrie, Okla., Aug. 11.—For the purpose of building an electric line between Minneapolis, Minn., and the Gulf, double-tracked, a company has been chartered with \$50,000,000 capital stock under the name of Minneapolis, Kansas City and Gulf Railway Company, with headquarters at Minneapolis. The proposed route is via Des Moines, Kansas City, Wichita, Guthrie, Oklahoma City, Dallas, Waco, Houston and Galveston, with branch lines connecting Topeka, Omaha, St. Joseph and Lawrence, Kan.

The main line, as routed, runs direct from Minneapolis and St. Paul to Des Moines, Ia., thence on a beeline to Kansas City and to Wichita via Ottawa, Kan. From Wichita south it will pass through Ponca City, Guthrie and Oklahoma City to Dallas, thence south to Galveston, where connection will be made with Gulf steamship lines.

The stock of the company is in the hands of the Northern Securities Company of Minneapolis, which is acting as fiscal agent for the company. C. B. Holmes, former president of the Chicago City Railway, is chairman of the board of directors.
