The machine went about twice its length and capsized. Clarence was bringing the small engine to help in righting the overturned engine.

Advice on household economy is nicely offered by Charles M. Schwab in a recent interview. It would seem that Mr. Corey ought to be more of an authority on topics of that kind.

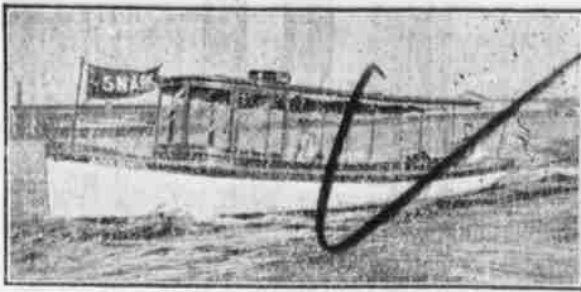
Fish doesn't agree with Harriman, but as Harriman doesn't like Fish it ought to be possible to avoid any serious digestive difficulties.
