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THE OREGON FARM.

The introduction of labor saving machinery into the industrial world, the concentration of the great work of manufacturing raw material into its various useful forms, the consolidation of interests and the increase in the productivity of machinery have sent a large proportion of the American people out of the work shop and store, and into the country. Everywhere good land is coming more and more into demand, so that in no part of America is good land worthless, as it was formerly supposed to be. To the New Englander who has felt the necessity of abandoning his sterile farm and seeking new and virgin fields, it seems surprising, that in the far west, land can be considered worth more than It is in thickly settled New England. He can not at first understand it. But when he comes to examine the subject analytically he finds that an Oregon quarter section in Coos county, for instance, which contains a few hundred thousand feet of timber has a market value for its timber at once. Three million feet is not extraordi nary and \$3000 for such a quarter section would be small. When the timber is removed it is still very valuable as a dairy farm and, the soil being good, the income from such a farm will enrich its owner in a few years. A New England farmer, working with one tenth the en ergy which he employed on his New England tract would make these Oregon tracts to bloom and blossom like the rose and would, in a short time, convert this district into a garden spot equal to anything in the world. The land is America's only hope-but it is a hope which transcends that of any other country occupled by the white race.

It would have taken no chances. The National banking law compels the publication of such statements five times a year. In addition to this the bank is subject to examination at any time and its officers never know when to expect a call. OFFERS TO RETURN

After 7 Years, Man Accused of Implication In Goebel Murder Will Face Court.

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 27 .- William S. Taylor, ex-governor of Kentucky, whose extradition has been sought by that state since the assassination of Governor Goebel seven years ago, last night gave out a and to testify in the Caleb Powers case, if he can be assured absolutely of fair treatment. In his statement Mr. Taylor says:

"If Commonwealth Attorney Robert B. Franklin has power to promise immunity, will cause what remains of the \$100,000 corruption fund to be returned to the treasury of Kentucky, no part of it to be used in these prosecutions, thus putting my case on the same footing as other criminal cases, will guarantee that E. L. C. Farrin all trial juries in my case shall be composed of six upright Democrats and a like number of upright Republicans, will guarantee that bail will be granted me within the limits of \$100,000, will dismiss the indictments against all parties used as prosecuting witnesses except myself, leaving them free to testify without fear, coercion or restraint, and, last but by no means least, will in advance, by mutual agreement, select an able, upright and impartial judge to try my case, I will without any promise of immunity, voluntarily and gladly return to Kentucky, not only to testify in the Powers case, but to Francis H. Clarke submit myself to trial before a jury of my native state."


