BANDON NEWS ITEMS

Bandon, Aug. 31, 1907. The festivities of Pioneers' day here were delayed yesterday forenoon by the funeral of Mrs. Geo. Button. Mr. Button is still dangerously ill from the same malady, measles; the week old infant is doing well. Dinner for 250 pioneers and veterans was served yesterday at noon in the G. A. R. hall and in the evening a program of speeches and reminiscing by pioneers and music by the band was given to a crowded audience on the camp grounds. It is estimated that over a thousand campers were on the grounds, in tents and covered wagons. The Commercial Club has received the cuts for their new pamphlet on Bandon, and they are now being prepared by the Recorder print shop. Frank Sweeny, of Portland, is in Bandon on business today. Ex-Senator Mulkey is in town today accompanied by Orville Dodge, of Coquille. By a mistake in the date of the Veterans' and Pioneers' reunions they were a day too late to take part in them. These gentlemen were both largely instrumental in procuring the appropriations for the Bandon and Coos Bay harbors. According to figures submitted by A. D. Laird; Slaughter House, Woodland Add., Robinson & Wright; Power House, Bandon Light & Power Co., 50x40; Cody Mill, capacity 100,000 feet; Lyon & Johnson Mill, 50,000 feet; Price Ship Yard; Residence building, 10 rooms on Atwater street, Capt. Panter; 6 room residence, Azalea Park, Professor Osteln; two five room cottages, West Bandon, W. A. Kennedy; four room cottage in Plat A., E. C. Gilbert; four room cottage, West Bandon, R. W. Boyle; five room cottage in West Bandon, George Hite; eight room residence, East Bandon, Phillipot; five room cottage, Azalea Park, Geo. Cody; six room residence, O'Neill's Add., J. J. O'Neill; four room cottage Old Bandon, J. Devholm; three room cottage, Port Add., C. L. Law; four room cottage, Port Add., L. Nelson; three room cottage, Port Add., C. Plans for the following are being prepared: 50-room hotel to be built in Woodland addition by George Montgomery. It will be elegantly furnished and run on the European plan. Building 100x40 to be built by Geo. P. Laird under contract to the Bandon Athletic Club for gymnasium purposes on Atwater street. Lumber orders for 20 new residences are in at the various mills; but the local supply at present is inadequate. The gasoline schooner Monterey arrived last night from San Francisco with machinery for Cody's mill and the S. S. Elizabeth left at 7 p. m. the same day with a cargo of 300,000 feet of lumber, 100,000 shingles and a deck load of broom handles for San Francisco. Rumor has it upon good authority that a new Trust and Savings bank is being organized in Bandon by outside capitalists and the local bank's attorney. G. P. Topping has purchased and holds the best banking site in the town. Attorney T. B. Minot, of San Francisco, is in Bandon for a few days. He will remain during the coming term of circuit court. R. E. L. Bedillion was among the list of passengers to San Francisco via Str. Elizabeth. A large school of whales have been playing just outside the harbor bar for several days. Dist. Attorney Geo. M. Brown, is in Bandon today. Bandon base ball fans have noticed with pleasure the statement in the San Francisco bulletin that Willis Ordway, utility outfitter for San Jose,

has come into a large estate with a title and seat in Parliament in England. He will be remembered as the young Englishman who was roasted by a stern parent until he packed up and left for America to make good as a base ball player here.
