BANDON NEWS ITEMS

Bandon, September 8, 1907.
 The delegation of Eastern Star members from Bandon who have been attending the district convention of the order at Myrtle Point returned last night via Steamer Liberty. About twenty members went from here and they report a splendid time.

Attorneys Geo. P. Topping and G. T. Treadgold arrived in Bandon last night to spend Sunday; they will both return to Coquille for the session of Circuit Court commencing tomorrow.

The launching of the Steamer Borodoln at the Prosper yards is announced for Wednesday, next; the little daughter of Capt. and Mrs. Maloney will christen her. Capt. Maloney has been employed by the owners to superintend her construction and he will command the vessel when launched. She will take on a cargo of lumber at North Bend and then will be towed to San Francisco where boilers, engines and machinery will be installed. She is a sister ship of the Steamer Wellesley which was launched from the same yards some five months ago.

The following is a list of merchandise shipped from Bandon, Oregon, during the year ending September 1st and for the month of Aug. 1907.

Lumber, (feet) year ending Sept. 1, 1907, 24,755,000; August 1907, 1,997,000. Matchwood, (cords) year ending Sept 1, 1907, 4,828; Aug. 1907, 800. Shingles, year ending Sept. 1, 1907, 10,065,000; Aug. 1907, 1,650,000. Broomhandles, (tons), year ending Sept. 1, 1907, 162; Aug. 1907, 68. Cordwood, year ending Sept. 1, 1907, 660. Fish (tons), year ending Sept. 1, 1907, 134. Miscellaneous (tons, including wool, woolen goods, vegetables, coal and dairy products, year ending Sept. 1, 1907, 1, 528, Aug. 1907, 82. These shipments were made by 18 vessels with an aggregate of 94 arrivals and 96 departures for the twelve months. These figures are compiled from the records of the United States Engineers' office at Bandon, Oregon, by the Commercial club.

The Rose Wharf and Storage Co., of this place are building an addition 75 x 50 feet to their new warehouse. Increasing traffic necessitated the enlargement.
