At eight o'clock we were comfortably seated in a strong, easy-riding, three-seated rig drawn by a pair of good horses. We made fourteen miles the first forenoon: eleven in the afternoon; seventeen the next morning and sixteen the last

afternoon. We had good meals and good beds and plenty of time for "kodaking." We arrived in Roseburg at five p. m. Thursday , well pleased with our trip. We passed through some of Oregon's finest timber land; past fruit and dairy farms; followed the upper Coquille for many miles, and had better mountain scenery than many people get who travel across a continent or across

the ocean purposely for it.
