### THE FRUIT EXHIBIT.

The first fruit exhibit ever held in Marshfield or on Coos Bay has been a great success and has resulted in arousing the people of Coos Bay as never before and as nothing else could in the fruit possibilities of this exceptionally rich and resourceful county. The most noticeable display was, of course, the beautiful and juicy Gravenstein apple and it is impossible to conceive or imagine that anything better can be produced. The Coos Bay Gravenstein is the most perfect of its kind and in applying the general name of the market to this apple we do not ignore the fact that a large portion of what may find a ready sale in San Francisco under that name come from the district which, strictly speaking, is called the Coquille Valley. But the producers there have no reason to be ashamed of the name Coos Bay for the prize in this case went to a box of apples grown on Coos River, and belonging in fact as well as name to Coos Bay. This box of apples was so highly and beautifully colored and so perfect in size and shape, that it was evident to all observers that they would take the prize.

The Chamber of Commerce and its able secretary are entitled to the thanks and the congratulations of the whole county. The whole display, in its every feature, was creditable both to the promoters of the exhibit and the producers. It was a wonderful commentary on the resources of the county and demonstrated as nothing else ever did or could the resources of wealth which the people of the county cannot now overlook. It is more than this. It brought the farmers and horticulturists together in a common bond of sympathy, and set in motion the forces which will create a strong public spirit, and foster a most admirable home pride. It has advertised the county as no amount of literature could. It has invited the hosts of visitors who through our streets to enter upon the lands where such products are possible and grow rich in working a fertile and productive field. Hundreds of visitors to the Chamber of Commerce have been delighted with what they have there seen, and very many of them have been induced to remain and become citizens of Coos Bay or the Coquille valley. Besides this the exhibit has enabled many to send reliable information to their friends and neighbors elsewhere, which will extend the reputation of the county far and wide.

It is understood that the Chamber does not intend to throw away the lessons which the exhibit has taught them. It is proposed to continue the excellent work and to acquire for constant display samples of every kind of product which can be kept. There were some samples of myrtle and articles made of myrtle at the rooms and it is hoped that the various manufacturers will realize that this method will enable them to advertise, not only the resources of Coos Bay, but also the wares which they expose for sale. That this exhibit in the form in which it developed was and is unusual and remarkable for a Chamber of Commerce will not detract from its special merit. Coos Bay is a proper place for the unusual to occur and we dare to hope that this will develop further into a permanent exposition which will have no small effect on the future of the Bay.
