**WILL MINE COAL ON RIVERTON PROPERTY**

New Company Organized to Seek Black Diamonds.—Will Operate Soon.

The Riverton Coal Company, a corporation organized for mining coal in the vicinity of Riverton, Coos county, will commence immediate work on its property which comprises a tract of several hundred acres. The mine will be opened at a point about 500 feet from the water and will be pushed with vigor. The chief owners in the business are Eureka men, though Mr. J. E. Warner, of the Blanco hotel has a considerable interest. Mr. L. C. Collins, who travels from San Francisco, also is interested in the venture and both of these men feel confident the investment is going to be a paying one. The secretary of the concern is L. B. Campton, of Eureka. The company has a large vein of the best Coos county coal to start on and they expect to build bunkers at the river's edge for loading vessels. The output for the greater part, will be shipped away to other ports.

**DRAIN NORMAL WILL RESUME**

**Citizens Subscribe Sufficient Funds to Run School for a Year.**

**SECURED IN 48 HOURS**

**School Is Provided with All Modern Conveniences—Stands on Slightly Elevation.**

Junction City, Or., Sept. 16.—The Drain normal school is to be operated this year. The citizens of that portion of the state have repudged the \$4,000 which was recently put up to secure the running expenses of the institution.

When the board asked for the keys, or the unconditional gift of the money subscribed, it nearly took away the breath of those who were planning to keep the doors open whether aid was obtained from the state or not. But, after learning that should they deposit each quarter an expense list and the money to cover the same, the board would consent to allow the school to open, it was not 48 hours until the full amount was resubscribed in accordance with instructions from the state board. The board made it plain no subscriptions could be received under the promise that the state would reimburse the donor at the next session of the legislature.

The institution is beautifully located on a slightly elevation, in the eastern part of the town of Drain, and is a combination of public and state school. The district in which the location was made, helped to construct the building, and the school funds are used in the instruction of the public school children only. Those who are taking the teachers' course in the normal department have the opportunity of teaching the district school children, under the watchful eyes of four critics, who are expert teachers.

The school is provided with every modern convenience, having splendid laboratories, boarding halls, etc. The Zamzambian society has been in successful running order as the literary department of the college for eight years, and is classed among the best societies in Oregon. There were last year over 200 students in the normal department and an equal number in the lower grades.

**U. P. BOND ISSUE GOES BY BOARD**

Syndicate Turns Over Jolly and Bonds Are Quoted Below Par.

New York, Sept. 16.—The Union Pacific syndicate which was organized to underwrite the \$75,000,000 convertible bonds, was dissolved today and the unsold bonds, which amounted to about \$70,000,000, were distributed to other syndicates which underwrote this large issue of bonds at 90, the same price at which they were offered to stockholders, less commission. The stockholders took up about four per cent of the total issue and the syndicate managers sold two per cent of these bonds. The bonds are quoted at 85 today.

**FINE COPPER LEDGE NEAR COOK'S INLET**

Thomas Kimball Code Gives News of Rich Strike in Northern Interior.

San Francisco, Sept. 15.—Thomas Kimball Code, a mining engineer just returned from Alaska, where he went for a syndicate to report on copper prospects, has arrived in San Francisco. Code brings a glowing report of a ledge half a hundred miles inland from Cook inlet.

"I found," said he, "extensive earth croppings and traces of a long ledge of sulphide of copper in a limestone formation. In one point the ledge is 146 feet wide and goes 6 per cent copper. I was able to follow the ledge for a mile. There are occasional outcroppings that seem to indicate that the ledge extends farther.

"The location of the property is 55 miles inland from Iliamna bay, on Cook inlet. A railroad will have to be built to carry in materials and to bring out the ore to the coast."

He believes he will have as many more, which would give him nearly five hundred bushels to the plot.
