## AFFINITY STORY TOLD IN COURT

Wilson Divorce Suit Followed by a Startling Human Narrative.

MUSIC TEACHER IS NAMED

Artist Dickman Involved, but Is Soon Exonerated of Complicity.

San Francisco, Sept. 28.—A counterpart of the widely discussed Earle case of affinity in New York has been developed in San Francisco, with the sexes of the principals reversed, as far as the relative positions of the spouses are concerned, but with prominence of the principals exceeding even those of the New York affinity discoverers.

The dramatic personae are William A. Wilson, a tea importer of this city; his wife, Ida Mansfield Wilson, a noted actress of great beauty, now in London; Charles Dickman, the artist and local clubman, who was at first believed to have been Mrs. Wilson's affinity, but was not, and Walter Olney, a music teacher, half the age of Mrs. Wilson, who turned out in time to be the real affinity.

The story was told in an affidavit filed yesterday in Judge Morgan's court by attorney R. W. Rovce, counsel for Wilson, during the hearing of a motion for payment of alimony brought by Mrs. Wilson. According to this affidavit, a year ago troubles began to arise between the husband and wife, especially after the complaint made by the former of the extreme attention paid to the wife by Artist Dickman. When, in the spring of 1904, Wilson rented a summer place at Pacific Grove, Dickman was a frequent visitor. When Wilson remonstrated with his wife in regard to her coldness toward him, she replied that she had discovered an affinity whom she could not resist, and asked that she be permitted to get a divorce. Wilson told her to think the matter over for a year; taking a trip abroad in the meanwhile, while considering the situation.

### Is Not the Affinity.

This she did, going to New York, then to London, with her mother and child, Dickman remaining here, the true fact came out that Dickman was not the affinity at all, and Dickman was cleared of all complicity. Further discoveries enlightened Wilson. He learned, continues the affidavit, first, that his wife had been accompanied on the steamer which took her abroad by Walter Olney, a youthful music teacher. Still later he was informed that his wife had deserted his child and mother in London, and was living in apartments near the Crystal Palace.

These discoveries were followed by a suit for divorce brought by Mrs. Wilson. Pending the suit the court

awarded her alimony and also \$1000 with which to return to this country and defend the suit. Yesterday's proceedings were based on Mrs. Wilson's counsel's claims that she did not get the alimony awarded by the court nor the \$1000.

Wilson resisted the demand for alimony by filing the affidavit, in which he cited the foregoing allegations, and added that he sent the money, not to her, because she had deserted the child, but to her mother, with whom the child was living, in order that the child might be supported.

The motion was submitted.

## YOUNG AMERICAN LOST IN EUROPE

Drops from Sight in Switzerland and Not a Clew Is Found.

Berne, Switzerland, Sept. 28.—Harold Telford, a young American from Gainesville, Ga., who was a student at the University of Zurich, and has been missing since July 30th, was at Engleberg, near Lucerne, when last heard from. On behalf of his family, Congressman Thomas M. Bell of the Ninth Georgia district has cabled to the American consulate at Berne to institute a search and to notify all other American consulates in Switzerland. The police are also investigating and the Swiss press is also interested in the case.

There are letters for Telford at the Zurich and Paris consulates. It is hardly possible that he has been the victim of a mountain accident, as no unidentified bodies have been discovered.

## CONSPIRATORS IN HAVANA'S JAIL

Washington, Sept. 26.—Official word of the arrest of conspirators in Havana reached the war department today in the following cablegram: "A wireless by Gov. Magoon to acting Secretary Oliver. Information more specific and certain than heretofore received was secured last night that Mazo Parra, angered by his failure to bring about an uprising, threatened to dynamite some buildings in Havana and then escape. The local police arrested him and two of his gang, named Miret and Dacaz and they are now in jail.
