Puyallup, Wash., Oct. 7.—After completing his trip to New York over the old Oregon trail in a prairie schooner, Erza Meeker has returned to his home in Puyallup. Today a big reception was given him by the pioneers, who are in session here. Erza Meeker made his long journey to the east after the fashion in which he came west half a century ago. At the gathering this afternoon he related his experiences along the way. His expedition was undertaken for the purpose of arousing interest in marking the historic highway which so many of the sturdy pioneers of the west travelled in early days.
