The total enrollment in all departments at the present time is between 750 and 800. At the beginning of President Campbell's administration in 1902 the attendance was 224. The present freshman class number almost as many students as the total enrollment at that time. It the present rate of growth continues it is expected the number of students next year will reach 600 in the departments at Eugene exclusive of music. The university offers no high school subjects, the requirements for entrance being the completion of the four year high school




