FINED FIVE DOLLARS

The police court had up the case of the City of Marshfield vs. William Smith, charged with resisting night watchman Condron, while the latter was in discharge of his duties as such on Wednesday the 16th. The evidence was to the effect that the defendant had felt aggrieved at what he claimed was the conduct of the night officer in using his billy on a man whom he had found asleep on one of the launches and had met the night watchman and had expressed his opinion that the latter had exceeded his authority. There nothing bolsterous about the criti-cism, but the night watchman stated he pushed the defendant and that the defendant turned around and put up his hands and that he, the night watchman pulled his billy and "went to him" and licked him by striking him quite a number of times with the weapon and then carried him to the police station under arrest. The evidence was somewhat at variance on the question of whether Smith raised his arms to ward off the blows of the officer's club or to show fight. Judge Upton decided that the officer far exceeded his authority in using his billy but that as the defendant had accosted the officer to criticize him and had failed to "cut it out" when he was told to, he was technically guilty of "resisting an officer," and should be fined \$5.00. While the court's opinion was that the officer had far exceeded his authority in beating the defendant with his club it is not understood that any charge has been lodged against the officer

New York, Oct. 22 .- To build a three story house in one solid piece at a cost of only \$1000, and to finish job in 12 hours-that is the the problem which Thomas A. Edison to-day told the members of the American Electro-Chemical Society he had solved, and he showed them the model to prove it. According to Mr. Edison, the house

of the future will be cast in concrete iron moulds from one solid from plece including stairs and bathtub. It will be fire proof and indestructiand from one set of moulds an indefinite number of exactly identical houses can be made. For protection against poor construction, he in-tends to restrict the use of his pat-ents to contractors of responsibility. who will agree to follow his formula

for making concrete. Some of the best architects in New York have contributed their ideas to the model which Mr. Edison showed. It is of a house that, in full size, will be three stories high, 25 feet frontage, and 45 feet from front to rear.
