

NEW SCHEDULE IS ENJOINED

Washington and Oregon Railroads May Not Collect New Lumber Rate Today.

WILL BE SETTLED LATER

Lumbermen of the Northwest Gain Temporary Advantage—Matter for Federal Courts.

Seattle, Oct. 31.—Federal Judges Wolverton and Hanford late Wednesday night at the conclusion of the hearing on petition of the Pacific Coast Lumber Manufacturers association for an order for temporarily restraining the Northern Pacific railway and other railroads from putting into effect on Friday the proposed increase in eastbound rates on lumber of ten cents per hundred pounds making the rate fifty cents instead of forty cents as at present, granted the injunction asked for against the railroads, pending final determination of the justice of the new rates by the interstate commerce commission. The court held it had jurisdiction and ordered that the injunction be effective against only the railroads which are made defendants in the suit. It held further, in order that the railroads might not be subject to penalties, they should be allowed to charge shippers the increased rate, but they should not be allowed to collect it pending determination of the suit. Bonds were fixed at \$250,000. The railroad attorneys asked that they be fixed at \$1,000,000 but the court held this unreasonable. Judge Hanford's decision applied to Washington cases and Wolverton's to suits pending in Oregon. The railroads enjoined are the Northern Pacific, Great Northern, C. B. & Q., Union Pacific, O. R. & N. Co., and Oregon Short Line.

Mr. Carver had contracted to haul a load of freight from Roseburg to Myrtle Point and it was a heavy haul, taking six horses for the work. When two miles this side of Camas valley, on a high bluff, twenty feet of the roadway slipped out and let the horses and wagon down over the precipice. Mr. Carver escaped injury, but one of his horses was killed, and some of the others scratched and bruised considerably.

SMALL BROWN MEN DO NOT WANT PHILIPPINES

Noted Educator University of Tokio Discusses "Live" International Problem—Will Publish Book.

Dr. Sakuyi Takahashi, professor of international law in the Tokio University, is registered at the Oregon Hotel.

"I have been in your country about one week," he said yesterday. "I landed at Seattle and came from there here. I hope to remain in your beautiful city until November 1, when I shall leave for San Francisco. After spending a few weeks in that place I shall go to New York, where I expect to remain from three to four months. Then I hope to go to London, and perhaps to other European places before returning home to Japan."

"I came here to have my book published in English. It is about 'International Law: Especially in Regard to the Russian-Japanese War.'"

"Have you any Americans studying in the Tokio University?" he was asked.

"I am sorry to say that there is not one. There are a few Englishmen, and many Chinese and East Indians, however. The Tokio University dates back under our old system to the fifteenth century; but under the modern system is only forty years old."

"I also came to America to act as a messenger of international goodwill in a small way. You know that Japan looks on the United States as its friend among the nations because your country helped mine so much to be what it is today. Your naval officer, Perry, did Japan a great service that Japan has never forgotten."

"Does Japan want the Philippines? Would she consider buying them from the United States?" was another question.

"No, Japan does not want the Philippines. We have islands enough. The Philippines are inhabited by too many savage tribes that would cost too much to pacify, and who buy nothing from a highly civilized nation such as Japan is. We have no raw material for sale, in fact, we would rather import the raw products and manufacture them into perfected articles and then sell them to the world. Your country with its enormous stretches of land and comparatively few people can afford to sell raw products such as wheat and cotton to the Philippines, but Japan needs land even to feed her own people properly. It is not wise for a nation to be too much spread out, as would be the case if Japan had the Philippines. With the mainland it is different. An island nation means a great navy even for self protection, and Japan has enough islands. See the United States with so much land defended with so few ships as compared with your square miles and your inhabitants. 'No,' he added with a smile, 'the United States has a problem that Japan does not want. We are busy with what we have and all that Japan wants is peace with all the nations so that we may trade with them.'"

COMPANIES COLLECT COMMISSION WAGES

Vancouver Companies Import Japanese Laborers and Contract Their Labor to Railroads.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 31.—Hidden factors in the Japanese immigration were disclosed today by a witness named Ishikawa, before government Commissioner King, who is settling the riot damages. The witness declared that four immigration companies are operated in Vancouver. These companies are now prepared to bring large numbers of men from Japan and have made contracts with railway companies to supply laborers. The system is that agents of companies in Japan receive a stated amount for supplying men for from one to three years and sometimes longer. Ten per cent of every oriental's wage is collected by the employment agency. This applies to domestic servants as well as to mill hands and railway workmen. The boarding house keepers union in Vancouver controls the situation.

Injured By a Fall.

EXPERT SAYS OIL FIELD IS GOOD

Kansas Oil Man Looks Over Payette Oil Well and Talks Favorable.

Will T. Kirk, of Payette, who was in Boise yesterday, says that the oil excitement at Payette is unabated, and that the people there are confident an extensive oil and gas field is being opened up. The indications following upon the strike made a short time ago by the Oregon Oil & Gas company are very encouraging and he says there is scarcely any doubt that as soon as the well is cleaned of the sand that plugged it at the time of the blowout from 50 to 60 feet deep in the bottom another blowout of gas will occur and probably a strong flow of oil will be struck.

"The prospective oil field will be thoroughly explored," he said, "not only by the Oregon Oil & Gas company, but by other companies. Hydge Gowan, assistant secretary of the Snake River Oil company, is on the ground and says his company will save up a derrick and be ready for operations within 90 days after it is determined what kind of a strike has been made by the company now drilling, provided anything like favorable results are obtained."

"This company has 300 acres subleased from the Oregon Oil & Gas company, with the privilege of selecting the land in tracts of 60 acres each, not closer than 500 feet of any five wells the first company may sink. Then there are a number of local companies being organized which probably will begin drilling as soon as they can be financed and the machinery be secured."

"A. A. Little, of Independence, Kan., who is extensively engaged in the oil business in Kansas oil fields, came to Payette as soon as he received news of the oil and gas strike. He was there last week and after visiting the oil well and looking over the territory, he said that the field looked promising, the very fact that a little amount of oil, which was of fine grade, had been struck being indeed encouraging. This coming from an expert oil man, who naturally would be conservative, was flattering to the prospects we have of developing an oil field. He said also that it was seldom that such oil was struck but that a larger amount was struck at a greater depth."—Boise Statesman.

PREPARING FOR RHODES SCHOLARSHIP EXAMS

Will Be Held at Eugene On The 21st and 22nd of January.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 31.—The next qualifying examinations for the Rhodes Scholarships for this state will be held at the University of Oregon, Tuesday and Wednesday, January 21st and 22nd, 1908. The arrangements for conducting the examinations will follow closely those of last year, with the exception that an examination fee of \$5.00 will be charged all candidates. The examinations will be under the direction of the Oregon Committee of Selection, composed of President P. L. Campbell, of the University of Oregon, chairman, President Ferrin, of Pacific University, President Coleman, of Willamette University, President Crooks, of Albany College, and President Riley, of McMinnville College.

WORK ON HILL ROADS WILL NOT BE STOPPED

St. Paul, Oct. 31.—President Louis Hill, of the Great Northern, tonight denied the report that that road was to stop construction work. "I cannot see how the report originated," he said to the Associated Press; "The Great Northern has not stopped construction work and does not intend to. We see no reason to do so. We are shipping men west all the time." President Elliott, of the Northern Pacific said the "Northern Pacific is going on with its construction work in Montana and Washington, but is cutting down its force in Wisconsin and Minnesota."

GERMAN EDITOR IS ACQUITTED OF LIBEL

Orgies of Von Moltke and other Army Officers Will Cause Kaiser to Act Sternly.

Berlin, Oct. 31.—Maximilian Harden, editor of Die Zukunft, who was sued on a charge of libel by General Count Nuno von Moltke, was declared not guilty by Justice Kern today. In his decision Justice Kern said that his decision Justice Kern said that Harden was justified in attacking Von Moltke and other courtiers who surrounded the kaiser, and that he had performed a public service.

Harden's trial, which occurred last week, was the sensation of all Europe and for weeks previously it was the topic of conversation, especially among the military and government officials. Von Moltke's suit was evoked by an editorial written by Harden charging him and other officers with maintaining harems of immature native girls in Africa, and indulging in orgies of an unprintable nature. Public sentiment was entirely with Harden during his trial, and his acquittal is received with joy throughout the empire.

As Harden's acquittal is virtual proof of his charges, it is expected that the officers involved will be severely disciplined and probably dismissed from service by the kaiser.
