MONSTER MILLS OF LANE CLOSE

Wendling, Springfield and Saginaw Hands Out of Employment.

Eugene, Or., Nov. 7.—The Booth-Kelly Lumber company yesterday closed its big mills at Wendling and Springfield and they will remain idle until the new freight rate on lumber to eastern points is definitely settled and until there is relief in the car shortage situation. The company's mill at Saginaw was closed several weeks ago on the same account and the Coburg mill will close down just as soon as a few orders which are now being filled are gotten out, which will be inside of two weeks. The closing of the mills and the consequently shut down of the logging camps throws several hundred men in the country out of employment and will have its effect upon business conditions in Eugene and surrounding towns. The mills have been operating only on half time for several months past on account of the car shortage.
