

Suit Believed to be Move of Hills Toward Coast Line From Portland.

(Oregon Journal.) That James J. Hill is making efforts to construct a railroad line from Portland to San Francisco was made certain in the minds of railroad men with the arrival in Portmorning via Drain for Ashland on land several days ago of R. A. Bay, Roseburg & Eastern Railway & Navigation company extends up to the head of navigation on the Coquille river and runs through one of the richest valleys in the country. It is in reality the small part of a transcontinental system that is considered one of the most feasable yet broached for the advancement and development of the Pacific coast. That the line is one over which the Hill and Harriman interests will fight to the last ditch is further attested to by the facts that the company is on a paying basis. Another thing which promises a hard fight

among the big interests is Graham's dislike for Harriman and Spreckles. Of the latter, the forcible seizure of the road is sufficient to show the enmity existing between the two, while Graham is said to have developed a dislike for the Southern Pacific man for several reasons.

An incident of the Graham-Spreckels fued is recalled in the hearing of the interstate commerce commission which made a small investigation on the Coos Bay line last spring. Commissioner Lane was listening to the evidence and asked Mr. Graham if he did not regard Spreckles' intentions honest. 
