Offered Mrs. Bradley \$5000 and \$100 a Month Until Youngest Child Was 21.

OFFER SPURNED BY THE WRONGED WOMAN

Dr. Britton Evans Gets Excited in Giving His Testimony-"Brown Not on Trial."

Washington, Nov. 26 .- There were dramatic scenes in the Bradley trial today when Dr. Britton D. Evans who testified in the Thaw case, not only declared Mrs. Bradley insane when she shot Brown but entered with such vigor in defending his opinion in denunciation of the conduct of the senator that Judge Stafford reminded him that Brown was not on trial and was not there to defend himself and admonished him to refer to the dead man only when necessary to show the effect of his acts upon the mind of the defendant.

Dr. Charles E. Hill, professor of nervous diseases in the Baltimore Medical college, declared that in his opinion, Mrs. Bradley was insane when she did the shooting The man's abortions performed on her, suffering and disappointment and heriditary taint of insanity all combined to produce insanity in her.
