THE MONG COMPANY

Last evening Mr. and Mrs. William Mong made their first appearance in Marshfield at the Masonic Opera House in "Till Death Do Us Part" a character drama.

The piece was presented to a large and representative audience, and though it is one of that class of plays that appeals less to the general multitude on account of its "creepy" nature yet it was a decided success.

The play has some of the elements of Trilby. The story is that of the mesmeric power of Doctor Jacob over a young girl. The girl resembles the dead sweetheart of the old doctor's youthful days. In his age his passion becomes centered on his gold and the girl, Hinda Beckman. By his occult power he controls the will of the girl and when she is to become bound "Till Death Do Us Part" to one who has wronged her, the old doctor uses his power over the girl to aid him in taking the life of her betrayer and to establish her guilt in the mind of her lover whom the old doctor permits her to marry, with almost tragical results. The denouement evolves satisfactorily for the lovers, in the death bed confession of the doctor. A secondary love plot and picture of conjugal bliss and husbandly serfdom is sustained very pleasingly by C. M. Devere and Mayon Steward as James Podgett and Dora Smiley. Gus Bitner as Bud Hankins, the stiff legged sheriff, and George Driscoll as a typical backwoodsman, southern, justice of the peace present their low comedy characters to the satisfaction of the audience. Mrs. Clara Ingersoll as Laughing Annie plays the generally thankless wronged woman character of the piece. Edwin Vivian makes a good "straight" lead, as Tom Bridges. He has a voice with plain quality and latent power and very good stage presence. Mrs. Mong plays the leading feminine role with dignity, and sustains the character and dramatic interest in all she undertakes.

A good deal of praise is due Mr. Mong for his creation of a real character in old Doctor Jacob, the miser, gifted with hypnotic power which he uses for crime. Mr. Mong plays the part with great intensity and detail. He is full of suppressed power and yet plays the part with a naturalness that is surprising to see in Marshfield—yet he has a vibrant voice and reads his lines as though he had studied nature, as well as art. His make-up and acting in the last act are entitled to high commendation. Marshfield has something good in store for her.
