### ESTATES IN POLITICS

The Campaigner of November 24th prints a statement of several respected citizens of Marshfield and vicinity and one by Mr. John W. Flanagan who speaks as a representative of the Flanagan estate. It is understood that the Flanagan estate is a corporation and what is called in law a fictitious person. Exactly why Mr. Flanagan should speak as a representative of the Flanagan estate in favor of the election of Dr. Straw or any person is hard to understand. What has the Flanagan estate got to do with Dr. Straw's reelection, or what has the estate to expect from the mayor? It is not supposed that estates vote in Marshfield, especially as the constitution does not permit property qualifications for municipal voters. When Mr. Flanagan as a representative of the Flanagan estate, said he regarded Dr. Straw as an excellent mayor and people would benefit themselves by reelecting him, was the Flanagan estate speaking, and why? It did not give any specific reasons for its position and it is not understood that it has any.

Mr. Flanagan has a right, of course, to speak for the Flanagan estate but if the Flanagan estate is really interested in the result of this election would it not be well to state why? Would it be considered by the people of Marshfield that such interest should in any way be the issue of an election? Corporations have no vote under the present charter and it does not seem probable that they ever will have, but if they have any axes to grind they may go into politics. Will the Campaigner ask the representative of the Flanagan estate "what's up" and let us know in its next letter? Is there an African in the lumber yard and have the chickens been counted?

### Who is I. S. Smith?

Mr. I. S. Smith, Citizen's Candidate for Mayor, is a native of Oregon, having been born and raised on a farm in Polk County. He has lived in his native state all his life and has always been identified with its interests, traditions and spirit. In his youth he worked as a day laborer and then as a teamster, and saved enough to engage in the hardware business on a small scale in his native county at Independence. In 1888 he was elected sheriff of Polk county and in 1894 was elected a member of the Oregon legislature. His election to the legislature was secured by the largest plurality ever received by a candidate in that district before or since. Mr. Smith went to live in Vale, in eastern Oregon after his legislative service. Here he was unanimously supported by the whole Eastern section of the state for delegate at large from Oregon to the national convention which convened in Chicago in 1904.

While a member of the legislature Mr. Smith served on the Ways and Means committee, which is the most important committee of the legislature, handling as it does all the appropriations of the state money. This appointment was regarded as a merited tribute to Mr. Smith's well known business ability.

Mr. Smith stands first and foremost for a purely business administration of city affairs. He believes that publicity should be given to all transactions of the city council, and the officers of all departments of the city. He also believes that the proper books of account should be regularly and carefully kept and that all the records should be readily and always accessible to all inquirers. He believes that regular and complete itemized statements of all receipts and disbursements on behalf of the city should be published for the information of taxpayers and citizens. Mr. Smith thinks that all city work should be advertised and let to the lowest competitive bidder. He is in favor of all broad progressive policies and improvements which will further the substantial growth and development of Marshfield as a metropolitan city, but is opposed to the tying up of city money in real estate or other investments not needed for city uses. Mr. Smith stands for raising the saloon license from four hundred dollars a year to six hundred dollars a year, and will favor the retention of that figure and no more during the term of two years, with the best regulations possible under conditions as they now exist. Mr. Smith stands for Law and Order, and in all events will live up to his oath as chief executive if he shall be elected. He says: "It is not for the Mayor to make the laws but to see that they are enforced. I find there is no city ordinance giving the Mayor power to enforce Sunday closing, but if such a law did exist he should under his oath enforce it the same as all other laws, without favor or prejudice to any citizen or class of citizens within the city."

### CHICAGO WILL RESUME IN ABOUT TEN DAYS.

Chicago, Nov. 29.—President Mitchell, of the Illinois Trust & Savings Bank, and a member of the Chicago clearing house committee, said tonight that the announcement that Chicago banks will resume payments on a currency basis is a bit premature. He says no formal date is set for resumption of specie payments. From other sources it was learned the clearing house has started arrangements for return to normal conditions in about ten days.
