WIRELESS IS NOT SECRET.

Inland and are located on government reserves and at the forts. It is the intention of the war department to have a chain of stations to cover practically the same territory that the naval stations do.

According to experience, there is at present no secrecy in the service of wireless, for messages are intercepted frequently, and many are taken by stations which do simply a commercial business. In fact, the secret orders of the navy could be obtained by civilian stations and disclosed to enemies if the operators cared to turn them over. Of course the secret code of the navy is used in all of its messages, yet codes are easily translated by experts.

There is a commercial station being erected at Astoria, and it is practically completed. This station is the first of a chain that will be installed along the coast.

In speaking of the difficulty of finding some means of avoiding mes-

sages being taken by stations outside the naval service, Lieut. Parker cited the fact that a number of small boys in San Francisco had equipped a wireless station and intercepted navy messages. He spoke of the Sitka station as a fine piece of work. This was lately completed by Mr. Hanscom, a civilian in the employ of the navy department. Mr. Hanscom is the expert who has charge of the construction work of the stations, and is one of the best experts in the country.

Lieut. Parker will spend one day at the Blanco station and then return to Marshfield in season to take the Plant for the south. He will then inspect the stations on the California coast.
