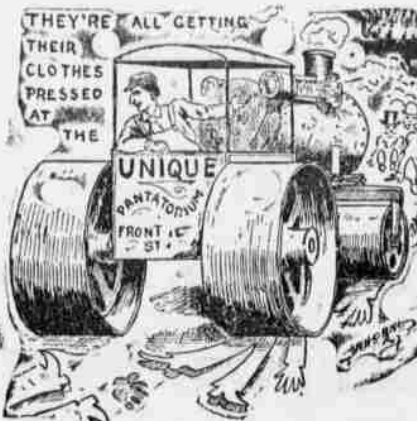

Ladies Give Dance.—The ladies

Marshfield held its annual dance in  
the Odd Fellows hall last night, and  
the enjoyable function was a pro-

standpoint. Nearly two hundred

Remained Here Over Night—The  
Breakwater did not leave here at  
ten o'clock last night as scheduled,  
but remained at her dock after blow-  
ing the whistle for all passengers to  
get aboard. She remained here over  
night and left for North Bend this  
morning to take on several carloads  
of freight. Just before noon the  
steamer left for the mouth of the  
harbor to cross the bar if conditions  
were favorable.

Council Meets Again.—There will  
be another meeting of the city coun-  
cil tonight for the purpose of catch-  
ing up with matters which have been  
held over during the governor's hol-  
idays. Quite a lot of work has been  
accumulated and there will be a num-  
ber of ordinances for street improve-  
ments passed. The mayor and coun-  
cil are anxious to clear the slate be-  
fore the first of the year in order to  
start in under good conditions.

Three New Townsites—Announce-  
ment of three new town plats were  
made in Coquille at the County court  
of Monday. The Title Guarantee &  
Trust Company filed notice of the  
East Side town plat, the property be-  
ing beyond East Marshfield. Mrs.  
Lobree filed notice of the Lebre  
Park addition, south of the city, and  
Major Kinney filed notice of Plat F,  
which is situated near Bangor. All  
three were recorded and adopted by  
the court.

Making Improvements—"Bob"  
Marsden is having a new cigar case  
installed in his billiard and pool em-  
porium today which will be unsur-  
passed by any other in the county.  
The case is ten feet long and is made  
of plate glass, with a base of marble.  
There is no woodwork about it and  
whatever is in the case may be  
seen from any part of it. The shape  
was designed by "Bob," who is quite  
an architect, and the case was made  
in Portland, being shipped here on  
the last trip of the Breakwater.

Thieves Steal Dow's Oil—A large  
hole was cut in the east end of the oil  
warehouse of Fred S. Dow, on the  
water front in Marshfield Monday  
night, and Mr. Dow said today that  
a quantity of oil had been stolen. He  
has not yet taken an inventory of his  
stock to find how much is missing,  
but he is confident that a considera-  
ble quantity has been secured. The  
thieves evidently tied a boat up to  
the end of a warehouse after which  
they cut a hole through the building  
large enough to pass a man through.  
The doors were then opened from the  
inside and the oil carried out. So far  
there is no clue to the perpetrators  
of the burglary.
