WHAT OUGHT TO BE.

Sunday's issue of the Oregonian contained an editorial which shows a disposition on the part of the Oregonian to be friendly to Coos Bay. This spirit would be productive of great good both for Portland and the city which commerce requires here. If all Oregon could realize that Portland is friendly to all parts of the state, it would result in mutual benefit. No doubt Portland is destined to be a great city and as great a city as San Francisco. We believe it has not retarded San Francisco's growth to have Los Angeles grow up to the south of her. It would be a great thing for Portland if a city of 75,000 would spring up on Coos Bay. But the Oregonian considers that it is a question of railroads. Everybody will admit that, but why, we ask the Oregonian, can not the State of Oregon take the initiative and build a road which it can lease to the big companies. Oklahoma proposes to build and operate a railroad. As the operation seems so complicated for a state like Oregon at present, why not build and lease the road? It would help all Oregon, and Coos Bay's greatness depends, not in the development of a part of Oregon, but all of it.

The following is a small extract from the Oregonian's editorial referred to:

"That Oregon has only one large town is due wholly to slowness of allroad development in the state. Here should be by this time a city of 5,000 inhabitants on Coos Bay. It is useless to expect in these days that cities will be built in places where there are no means of rapid and effective communication. Every modern city is a product of the railroad. It is the superior energy of allroad effort in the state of Washington that has carried the development of that state far beyond the development and growth of Oregon. The railroads have built Washington's towns and cities and have built the country by affording facilities for the movement of the people and the transportation of its products. Washington, with an area considerably less than that of Oregon, has three times Oregon's railway mileage. He tells the whole story. The railroad combination that controls Oregon has neglected the state, except for the purpose of shutting other railroad builders out of it."

AN OPTIMISTIC VIEW

President Dinkey, of the Carnegie steel company, gives it as his opinion at next year will be the most prosperous the industrial world ever has known. He must have some reason for a statement of that kind. Occupying such a position he has an opportunity to know what is being aped up, and his opinion is entitled much weight.

It will be hoped he is correct. And why should he not be? The only reason that can be found for the depression of this past fall is that there had been too much crooked financing and too much wildcatting. Those who must be about all cut out this time, leaving the field clear for such a tide of prosperity as the seer man prophesies.

When the shady operations of manipulators brought the pinch upon a country, we were in the midst of the greatest prosperity ever known and no one could see a weak point in the industrial situation. Nothing since developed to indicate there anything unsound in the structure of legitimate business. Why then, says not Dinkey be right in forecasting a great wave of prosperity when existing impediment shall have been removed?


