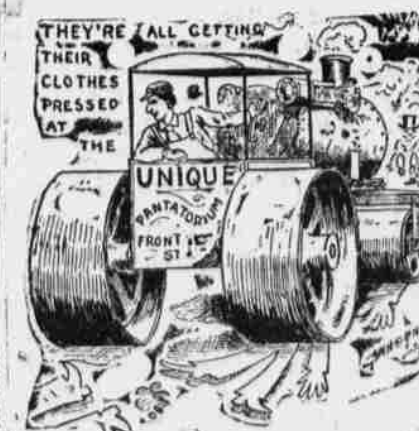

—There are nearly a dozen broken umbrellas lying around the streets of the city as relics of the fierce rain and wind of yesterday and the past few days.

Want That Gymnasium

—The local fire department is going after that fund for a gymnasium in the extended city hall building. The bad weather did not bring out the big crowd expected at the annual ball, and efforts are being made to interest merchants and business men towards securing the quarters for the fire department.

For Y. M. C. A. Building

—There is some talk of the First Trust and Savings Bank erecting an additional story to its new building to be used for the Y. M. C. A., which is being projected for Marshfield. The organization of this society is being talked up strongly in all parts of the city and the idea of securing such excellent quarters would be hailed with enthusiasm.

Mercy Hospital Gift

—Among those who have occasion to rejoice because of the Christmas times is the Mercy Hospital at North Bend. Everybody who has been on the Bay the last two years have had occasion to remark the improvement in that valuable institution, and especially the class of work being done to make the grounds attractive. J. C. Wilcox made the hospital a present of \$100, the same amount he presented last year, the money to be used to beautify the grounds.

The First Half Dollar

—Nailed up over the door of the dining room in the Blanco hotel with a huge spike, the first half dollar taken in that structure after it was finished in 1872 is still a curiosity to numerous visitors at the hotel. It has become tarnished by its 38 years of age, and hardly noticeable until attention is brought to it. The coin was issued in 1871 and a year later the Blanco hotel was opened by James Ferry. As a fortunate omen for the future business of the hostelry the half dollar was nailed over the door and it has remained there ever since.

Lemon Growing in County

—Pat Hennessey, superintendent of the Libby Coal Mines, has donated a branch of a lemon tree near his home, to the Chamber of Commerce. The branch has a couple of large sized lemons and a few small ones which may be grown successfully in Coos County. The tree at Mr. Hennessey's home is literally covered with the fruit and is in danger of breaking with the weight of the product. All the lemons are of large size and good quality. The tree is growing out of doors and proves conclusively that the production of lemons is another addition to the numerous resources of the soil, which may in time be the scene of lemon and orange groves.

—The annual ball of the volunteer fire department of Marshfield was a very successful function last night and over one hundred couples were present at the dance. Chief Nichols did the honors of the occasion in his usual graceful manner and the excellent Coos Bay Orchestra furnished the wherewithal for the poetry of motion which was a large part of the enjoyment. Quite a number of visitors enjoyed the gay scene from the gallery in the huge ballroom of the Odd Fellows' hall to such an extent that they were feign to join the light "fantastic." While the crowd was quite large, it is certain that the room would have held one of its biggest crowds had the weather been otherwise than terrible last night.

Both ladies and gentlemen streamed into the store all day long and the store was the liveliest and most sociable place in town despite the dreary rain. George's cheery invitation to everybody was irresistible. Stories were bandied to and fro, Christmas cheer was in evidence everywhere, and this social feature was a big success from start to finish.

Volume of Business With Local Merchants Greater Than Ever Before.
